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# President's Message

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**F**ans and participants of all sports like to grumble. Horseshoe pitchers are no different, though I often think there is a lot more for our size than with other sports. It's probably not so, just seems that way because I'm so close to the road that controversy travels.

The NHPA Executive Council is elected by you, the membership, much in the same manner that most Charter or club officers are elected. We are put into office to interpret and carry out the constitution, provide leadership and direction and hopefully bring improvement during our term. Now, all that is well and good but it can't happen if we are in office in name only without some reasonable authority to carry out the functions that are assigned, expected or routinely pop up. I'm not speaking here of just the NHPA officers but your charter, club and league as well. When you elect us to office, you put your faith in us and your trust as well. We are there to do the best job for the greatest number and not everything we do will please all.

Unfortunately, many members jump up and down too quickly when they see or hear of some change or new direction they do not personally like. Many begin to grumble before they have even investigated or tried to accept something. They just know they won't like it and it is probably done to somehow benefit the officers or the top pitchers. While this is mostly nonsense, I am dismayed by this common reaction.

We are a growing association. Our constitution, bylaws and rules are set down to be followed by our members. That means by our Charters and associated clubs. There is little

reason in my mind for Charters to have constitutions and rules that are completely different from those of the National. Certainly, some unique things from Charter to Charter may call for specific differences in the administration of Charter business but where those differences are not spelled out, the National guidelines and rules, always the rules, should be followed. If the National rules or bylaws are not to your liking, don't just ignore them and play or run your charter, club or tournament by a different code but, accept them as what the National has set as being best for the greatest number. Propose your dislikes and suggested changes to the Constitution or Rules Committee but if the committee or delegation of your peers votes against your idea, accept it rather than continue to grumble.

Because we are closer to that road of controversy, the National officers are aware of many current infractions and direct violations of our constitution, bylaws and rules. Some Charter officers give the NHPA lip service only and go about the game their own way. We can't let that kind of action continue if we are to progress and try to maintain some degree of uniformity and harmony in the game. Yes, new and different things have to be tried and some can be considered as being in conflict with the printed guidelines. It is however the responsibility of the NHPA officers to lend latitude to the controversial issues and try changes that might bring calm to the stormy issues. You have elected us to lead the association and our affiliated charters so, allow us the authority and latitude to do just that.

■ Minnesota's Bob Dunn has a hot hand right now as least as far as promotion of the sport goes. **KEEP  
YOUR  
CLAY  
DRY**

There have been many ways to cover horseshoe pits to both keep the clay from drying out in the hot sun and to conversely keep the clay dry during a shower. Most coverings have a hole in the middle to accommodate the stake and this hole presents a leak which allows the rain to soak the clay in the immediate vicinity of the stake. Here is an idea which covers up the stake and the hole to effectively keep your clay dry.

As can be seen in the photo, it is a simple solution which utilizes common plumbing parts. It consists of an 18 inch length of PVC 1½ inch pipe, a PVC 1½ inch cap and a plastic 1½ inch roof flange which is normally used for vent pipes. It is not even necessary to glue them together and the angle of the roof flange accommodates the angle of the stake very nicely. This solution also allows the particle board or other covering to have a larger hole making for easier installation over the stake. The PVC stake covers have been in use at my personal pits for about three years now and have held up very well.

Dear Dave,

In the game of basketball the team that scores a basket does not immediately get the ball back with a chance to score again. It is the team that is scored upon that gets possession of the ball. In the game of horseshoes it's the person who scores a point or points who then gets to go first constantly. I propose a happy median. It is this. The game begins. Player "A" throws his two shoes first followed by player "B" and his two shoes. Coming back, regardless of who gets the points, player "A" throws his two shoes first followed by player "B". Now again, regardless of who scores, player "B" throws his two shoes first followed by player "A". The same way coming back. This procedure continues until the game is completed.

The main feature of this alternate

pitch proposal is that it is completely fair to both parties. Some players could be intimidated by his or her opponent if every time they start to throw there is a ringer or two hugging the peg. As far as marking up the score, for those without scorekeepers, the person who is to pitch second would mark the scoresheet.

Again, I think that this proposal is the fairest possible way to conduct a horseshoe game — by giving both opponents an equal chance to shoot at an open peg.

One note here — if a pitcher goes on a "run" while pitching alternately he's really on a run, but if a pitcher gets a hot streak just because he's always pitching to an open peg, then it may not be necessarily so that he is the better pitcher on that given day.

Think about it and hopefully try it.

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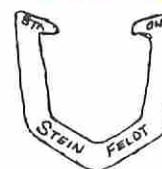
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# History of Horseshoe Pitching

In 1905 an Ottawa, Kansas team of four men challenged any other four man team to play for a cash prize of \$100. A team consisting of W. Fox, W. M. Baldwin, Robert Pierce and A. B. Argenbright of Kansas City, Missouri accepted the challenge. The Ottawa team consisted of Hollingsworth, Judge Robert Harrison, Seth Cope and a fourth who we could not identify.

The contest was pitched to pegs just two inches high above ground level and 38-½ feet apart. Players were required to stand back of the peg with their toe against it. A ringer counted 3, a leaner 2 and any shoe within six inches, counted 1 point.

Two men of the Ottawa team pitched first. One was placed by each peg and each pitched 80 shoes. When they finished, the other two Ottawa team members pitched the same way. Altogether, the Ottawa team made a total of 444 points. Then the Kansas City team, pitching shoes made out of rasps, took their turn at 80 shoes each and scored a total of 447 points. The high individual was Argenbright who made 144 points, beating the high man of the Ottawa team by 3 points. This 3 point difference in the game and total match came on the last shoe when Argenbright pitched a ringer on the two-inch peg.

About 1907, Manhattan (Kansas) College offered a prize for the best two men teams and also the best individual pitcher. Argenbright and Pierce won first prize for the team while the award for best individual went to Frank Jackson who then lived in Blue Mound, Kansas. During this competition, each team played every other team one 21-point game while the individuals played each other the same way.

According to the best information available at the time, the first horseshoe pitching tournament in which competition was open to the world was held the summer of 1909

in Bronson, Kansas. The winner, Frank Jackson, was awarded a World Championship belt. Details as to points or ringers are not available but it is known that Jackson had never heard of being able to hold a shoe so it would open toward the peg. He had however, been practicing to find some way by holding his shoe with his finger around the heel caulk so he could pitch ringers.

The games of this first championship were played on dirt courts with the pegs still just 2 inches above the ground and 38-½ feet apart. Frank Jackson had acquired the skill of pitching a ringer over the peg and laying his second shoe on top of the first so his opponent couldn't keep his ringer on. This tournament was not a round robin as we know it but rather sudden death. Each man drew a number with #1 playing #2, #3 played #4 and so continued until every man had played. The numbers were drawn again by the winners while the losers were out. Play continued in this manner until the last winner was declared the World Champion.

Two or three years later, around 1912, the height of the peg, now called a stake, was raised to six inches. Ringers counted 5 points, a leaner counted 3 and the closest shoe, regardless of distance, counted 1. The top ringer received the count of all ringers that were on the stake under it. This meant that if two ringers were already around the stake, the man who threw a third and top ringer would score 15 points. Games were still 21 points and there was no regulation as to the weight or size of a horseshoe. One pitcher was known to have a shoe in which the curve on one side was four inches more than the other side. At a Topeka Tournament, Jackson used a pair of horseshoes he had made by a blacksmith who bent the caulks so the shoe would slide better in the sand and help him get more ringers.

Tournaments were held in Kansas City, Missouri or Kansas nearly every year and Jackson successfully

defended his title of World's Champion each time. The writer has been unable to find any records for these events held before the 1915 tournament in Heathwood Park, Kansas City, Kansas.

Because there was no uniformity in the rules of the game as played in different localities, the best and oldest horseshoe pitchers from different parts of Missouri and Kansas got together in 1913 and agreed to adopt a uniform set of rules. After many games were played and each particular difference in each rule had been tested and tried out, a committee formally adopted what they believed to be the best. Then the question was asked by what authority these rules were adopted and were to govern the game.

The first ruling body for the game of horseshoe pitching that can be documented, was organized in the First District Court of Kansas City, Kansas, in May 16, 1914. A constitution, bylaws and rules were adopted and officers elected. The name chosen was The Grand League of the American Horseshoe Pitchers Association. Charters were granted to local leagues in many states and the newly adopted rules and regulations were accepted as standard in governing all regular horseshoe tournaments. The ruling body established that like values always cancel like. The stake was raised to 8 inches but the distance between them remained 38-½ feet. They established the weight of shoes for the 1915 Annual Tournament at a minimum of two pounds and a maximum of two pound three ounces. Ringers remained 5 points, leaners 3, close shoe 1, but no shoe beyond six inches could score. The pitchers box was 3 feet each side of the stake and six feet back. A pitcher could stand anywhere in the box. To support this, they published a book called the "Horseshoe Guide" containing playing rules, along with reports of the officers, the annual convention, tournament and other contests.

# THE QUEST *for the Perfect Pitch*

Slipping between the cool sheets seemed to soothe aching muscles which tightened at the very thought of having to face the challenge once again. Relaxing each muscle offered little comfort after thinking about the years spent analyzing and practicing each movement to make the ever elusive skill of perfect pitch a little closer to reality. The last thought before slipping into the unconscious world of sleep was, "In the sport of horseshoes you're only as good as the disciplines your willing to apply."

The penetrating sounds of the alarm clock forced a rude awakening from the safe confines of sleep. The same morning rituals were performed as if it were any other day of practice. It was not until calloused fingers ran across the carefully sewn patches of the shirt, that one was reminded of path which marked the quest. One by one each stepped onto the court, facing the challenge of nature with practiced skills and mastered disciplines. Each challenger's attitude now matched the cold steel of the pegs which stood waiting in the pits.

Ringers fell upon ringers sparking the already electric atmosphere of the horseshoe court. It was in the third game and at the end of forty shoes when only one of the many challengers had in fact pitched forty ringers leaving only ten more to prove there was a perfect pitch. A hush grew in the wind as the news was communicated by a subtle series of gestures and whispers that someone was very close to the elusive perfect pitch.

All eyes turned to watch the challenger strain as each muscle flexed to place accurately eight more shoes with caulks that would grip then dance upon the peg, teasing all until the last possible moment. The face of the challenger showed a slight smile

which played quietly on parched lips. Then, as if all that watched became as one they could sense the sadness that replaced the smile because the quest would soon be done. A flash of self control washed away all thoughts as the challenger stepped into the pitching box for the last two shoes which still remained.

Taking a deep breath the challenger pitched the first shoe in one fluid motion which sailed a straight course, ringing loudly on the peg with practiced skill. One could not tell if the sudden intake of breath was from the crowd or from the challenger because all seemed as one. A gust of hot wind swirled about the court as the challenger prepared to deliver the last shoe. The pitch arched higher than it had before and moved in slow motion across the court landing with a deep thud.

Tears from the lack of blinking obstructed all eyes from a clear view and each craned their neck to see if the shoe had found its mark. The challenger stepped to the rear while the opponent finished pitching. It

was the opponent's voice that spoke the words each desperately wanted to hear, "Four shoes dead." In the silence of the moment somewhere in the wind a thought which sounded like a quest occurred to the challenger, "Could perfect pitch be repeated once again?"

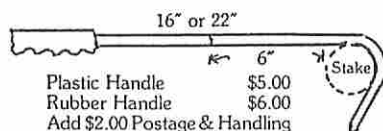
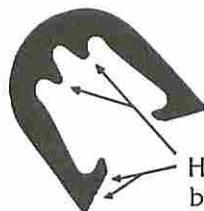

On May 12, 1990, pitching at the Sonoma County courts in Santa Rosa, California, Walter Ray Williams Jr. again proved the truth of his "Deadeye" nickname. This time, it was a new World Record for tournament percentage. Pitching an eight person round robin, 50 shoe games, Walter had games, not necessarily in order, of 86, 88, 90, 92, 94, 96 and 100%. That's 323 ringers in 350 shoes for a new World Record of 92.28 percent. That broke the old record of 91.6% held since 1960 by Dean McLaughlin of Canada. And yes, in so doing, Walter had a perfect game of 50 ringers in 50 shoes. This was his third perfect 50+ shoe game and the first since 1982 when Carl Steinfeldt had the last 50 shoe perfect game.

# TIPS FROM THE TOP

Fernando Isais and Don Titcomb, two California pitchers who for years were among the top four in the world. Between them, they hold 10 World Titles and their individual but classic styles, have long been considered to be among the best the sport has seen.

Fernando, a right hander of Spanish Basque descent, probably threw the most beautiful, mesmerizing 1-¾ turn one could ever hope to see. Don throws an easy 1-¼ turn from the left side. Both were accomplished bowlers in their prime and credit the game in part for some of their success on the horseshoe courts. Both of these gentlemen are considered authorities on the teaching of the game. With that in mind, here are some fundamental tips that may help you with your game.

**STANCE....**Fernando, who started as a 1¼ pitcher but found the faster turning 1¾ more to his liking, suggests a position about even with the stake. The feet are close together with the body weight mostly on the right leg (right handers).

Don also has a similar starting position with the step foot slightly in front of the other. This balance position is most important as it sets the stage for all that follows. The body is in an upright position without too much forward lean. Having somebody nudge you from the side or back should not move you from this stance position if you are balanced.

**SWING....**Both Don and Fernando raise the shoe to a "sighting" or "aim" position. Don brings the shoe in front of him with the elbow slightly bent to sight the stake while Fernando uses a near full arm extension out in front with the elbow and wrist straight. While Don brings his shoe in closer to aim, it should be noted that he also pushes it away from his body so that when the back swing starts, his arm is fully extended out from the body just as Fernando's.

With the arm now fully straight out, you swing the shoe down and behind you to a stop position that is

most comfortable for your arm. Note that the "stop" position is really not a stop but more of a hesitation at the end of the backswing just before the forward swing starts. During the backswing, the body begins to lean forward at the hips. Let the weight of the shoe carry much of your backswing. If you rush the backswing, you will most likely find your step and forward swing slightly out of synchronization which often leads to short and unopened shoes.

As the horseshoe is now on its down swing, it is kept on a vertical plane until the shoe has passed your leg. Once that upswing begins, your arm and hand begin to rotate to a near "palm up" position where the horseshoe is released when your arm is somewhere between your chest and eyes. As the shoe is released, your arm should sense a "reach for the stake" to provide better directional control with some authority. Remember, a short low shoe is being released too soon while hanging on too long, can cause a shoe to take flight without directional authority. At the point of release, do not stop or jerk your arm off to the side. Rather, let it continue upward in a natural follow through. This will give better direction and turn to the horseshoe.

This is only a part of the game of horseshoe pitching that looks so easy but can be so difficult to master. Pitching at the Championship level is gruelling and calls for great physical endurance and steady nerves. Summer heat is the sister of fatigue and the poorly conditioned pitcher will quickly find him/herself in trouble. So, if you truly want to improve your game and body, many hours of practice must be devoted to the game. Results will not come overnight but like any sport, "practice counts".

## Toll Of Time

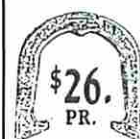
RAY MARTIN

Ray "Shorty" Martin, of Philo, Illinois, stood tall among his fellow men. Holder or co-holder of eight World Tournament records, Martin died March 13th at the age of 61.

A top pitcher for many years, Ray will probably be best remembered in horseshoe pitching circles for the world record game he and Red Henton had in 1965. It was the longest W.T. game ever, 194 shoes. Ray pitched 174 ringers for 89.7% and lost. In that game, they had 63 "Four Deads" and 316 Cancelled ringers, both world records that still stand.

Ray Martin was very competitive in many sports. He bowled as good as he pitched and for 25 consecutive years, Shorty was named to the Champaign, Illinois, County Bowling Association All Star Team. He was bowler of the year 14 times and is in the Illinois State Bowling Hall of Fame. Martin was also inducted into the NHPA Hall of Fame in 1980. He won the Illinois State title 8 times and on 12 occasions finished among the top men in the Championship Group of the World Tournament. Ray's best was a second place finish in 1965 though for years he averaged well over 80%.

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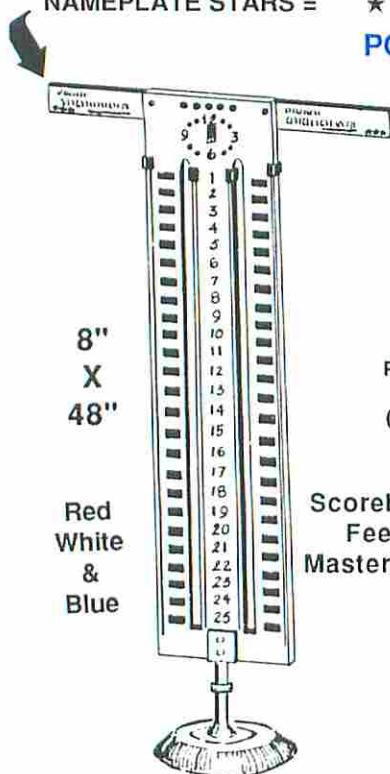
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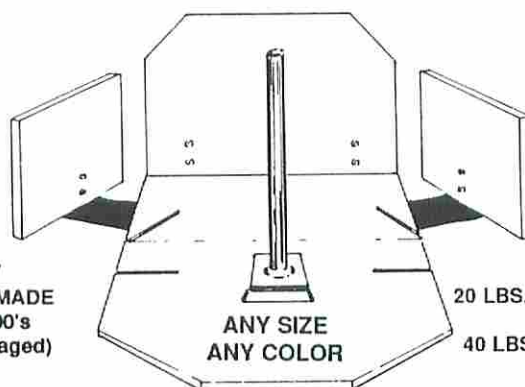
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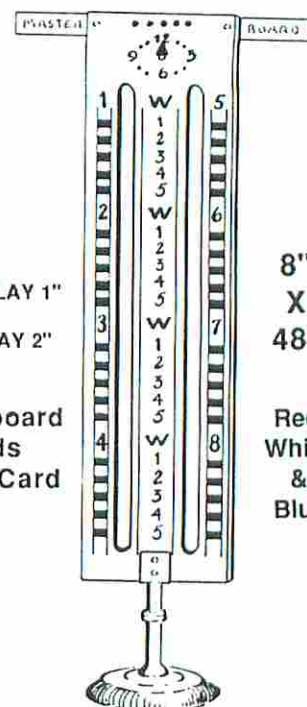

# Team World 1990

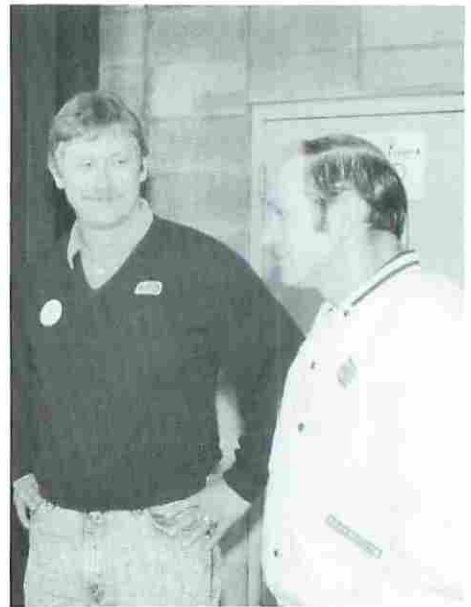
**BELOIT, WIS.** "It's going to be a few minutes," the announcer, Len Meistad, warned, "this is very close." The Indiana-2 team of Snyder and the Seibolds waited with the Minnesota team for officials to tally results of their re-played play-off game.

Going for the championship, Indiana-2 and Minnesota, both, won and lost two games. They re-played the match; it happened again, another 2-2 tie. Rules had it that match would be determined by points. The points were equal - 83 each. Rules said, go to ringers. Indiana-2 had scored just one more ringer. Expressed as a percentage, Minnesota lost pitching 71.25% to Indiana-2's 71.875%.

Twenty teams came to Beloit, Wisconsin representing some of the best pitchers from eight states and two Canadian provinces. Some journeyman teams come just to pitch along. It is an individual treat to be on the courts with world class pitchers. But within the top ten, all were competing for the title of 'Team Champions' at Team World.

The tournament began effected by typical Wisconsin weather. Jerry Roussel and Loras Grant did not figure on the morning fog and the new highway numbers. They missed their first games. Wet and cool evolved to warm and sunny but it took a while. Ralph Dykes, on the charts, checked all names for proper spelling. He had to white-out Don Titcomb because Walter Ray Williams Jr. was flying in.

Starting fifteen minutes late, things got progressively worse. Matches proceeded only as fast as the slowest pitchers. One fellow had to send out for a new pair of pants; apparently after a tough game. Don Kangas and Clarence Bellman were noted to have pitched one of the fastest 40 shoe games in recent





times. An official, John Secord, will swear it looked like all four shoes were in the air at the same time. At 5:00pm Saturday, pitchers were advised to turn their watches to California time in an effort to make the schedule look better.

The teams pitched 14 matches Saturday and 5 more on Sunday. The schedule was purposely unseeded so that a portion of the teams would not get blown-out on the first day. It worked. There were four likely finalists in the early shift all exceeding 50 wins when the second shift took to the courts for their last attempt.

Wisconsin and Missouri fell short with 48 wins. California stalled at 50. Lowest win number to make the finals was 51. Illinois-2 crammed to win 16 of the last available 20 for a total 52, good for fourth position on the ladder. Kentucky's 51 wins was just a near miss as their ringer per cent figured to one-tenth of one per cent less than Leroy Rowe's crew who also had wins totaling 51.

A look at Dykes' charts showed the Webster-Powell and company had 1,964 ringers and Rowe's crew tossed 1,968.

Top guns, Minnesota, being Negaard, Hughes, Lipovsky, and Nathe had 58 wins. Rival Ontario was next best with 53 wins, followed by Indiana-2 with 52; also 52 in fourth was Illinois-2. On the bottom of the ladder, and glad to be there, Indiana-1.

The finals began with that Indiana-1 team, 5th on the ladder, playing Don Peters' Illinois-2 team to an even 2-2 match. Rowe's crew pulled it out on points and went on to meet their counterpart Indiana-2. With no respect for numbers, Snyder and the Seibolds took it from Indiana-1 and started their way to the top. They next overcame the best one-two punch in the house, Steve Hohl and Sandy McLachlin of the Ontario team. The rest is history — the subsequent ties with Minnesota. That point counting got a little exciting when the scorekeepers took out the name cards and rolled the points back to 0-0. A one ringer tournament victory—that's how the shoe turns.

Our host, the Beloit Horseshoe Club, worked hard to make this a fine tournament. Beloit also sponsored the impressive traveling trophy awarded to Indiana-2. That's a good omen: It's a seed sown for the next year — Team World 1991.

## Team World Results

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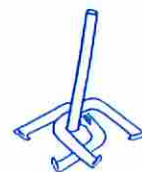

## CALIFORNIA

Daniel Jeff is quickly becoming one of Bishop's top prospective athletes — football, basketball, baseball and HORSESHOES. He's one of Eastern Sierra Horseshoe Pitching Association's top members. He racked up the Junior title in 1987. At the two-day Calico tournament he won six straight to win Class D, closing with a 41.7%.

Other club members who placed third or better were Don Rissano, Steve Oglesby, Tom McQueen, Sandra Hernandez, Mike Story, Alan Steele and Dorothy Yeager. Twenty from the club pitched in the tournament.

Highlights for the Northern California group in 1989 are as follows: Most Improved: Josephine Charley, up 15.1%; Earl Rapp, up 17.8%; and Travis Seal (Jr.), up 14.2%. R.J. Thomas entered 59 tournaments to top the men, Billie Sue Pennington pitched in 34 and Travis Seal entered 15. Sharon Paddock's 88% single game led the women, Walter Ray had a 97.5 and Jim Ornelas (Jr.) fired a 70% single. Don Titcomb led the field in first place awards with 12. Charley has 11 and Pennington 10.

## CANADA

FROM THE PAST: Horseshoe pitching became an organized sport in Canada after the World Champion, Putt Mossman, came up to Sarnia, Ontario from the United States in 1925 and put on a demonstration of how to throw the "open" shoe with most of them landing on the stake as ringers.

His audience for the most part were enthusiastic young teenagers from Southern Ontario who sat wide-eyed and open-mouthed watching the World Champ toss ringer after ringer. Those budding young horseshoe pitchers took in every word Putt Mossman said as the gospel truth.

That is why Canada's first Champions after 1925 were teenagers. In fact, the Canadian Champions from 1929 to 1939 were dominated by young pitchers in their teens and twenties.

Fortunately there were some outstanding organizers in the 1920's. Men like Walter Kane, Harold Shipman,

James Labbett and Albert Bersch who worked diligently to promote the Dominion Championships and were successful in forming a Canadian Horseshoe Pitching Association.

## COLORADO

The Colorado Hall of Fame plans to display every model of sanctioned shoe in their building.

Rich Pintor, two-time Colorado State Champion, who finished 7th in the World at Pleasanton, held instruction sessions in pitching in April. Classes included a review of rules and regulations, drills for ability, monitoring progress in percentages and tips on strategy and improvement of your game.

Tuesday night champions—Millie Harvey, Ivan Colpitts and Sandy Brown—defeated the Wednesday night winners—Don Hogsett, Skip Vaughn and Sheila Rohde, 6-3, in the Denver Metro Club's overall League Championships. The Tuesday group then defeated the Wednesday morning team, 9-0, for the title.

## GEORGIA

The opening tournament of the Georgia season attracted only a few hardy souls mainly because of the long drive for most Georgia pitchers for this Southern Open. Andy Pejko of Albany finished on top in the finals with consistent pitching in the handicap tournament. Preliminary Class winners were Betty Steinfeldt (Roswell), W.L. Gore (Douglasville) and Pejko.

Pejko, the low percentage pitcher, handicapped himself to the win going in with 27.6. Steinfeldt had 72.8 and Gore 47.2.

Just proves that the low percentage pitcher still has a chance to win in handicap tournaments and league play.

The 16 new courts at Stone Mountain were the scene of the Big Rock Classic. Betty Steinfeldt won Class A, George Bradfield captured Class B, Lester Talton took "C" and Maxine Albertson was the "D" winner.

## ILLINOIS

Charter President Dave Shreve pointed out that there is no restriction by the NHPA against a pitcher competing in the same sanctioned tournament twice so long as he moves up to a higher class for the second round. The results will be counted as two tournaments. The pitcher is expected to pay a second entry fee for the second round.

Tournament directors could have a problem scheduling this person or persons at different times...and possibly not on morning and afternoon shift the same day. Wonder what would happen if the director had several pitchers wanting the second class?

This item is included as a guide to other states who may wish to encourage this type of entry.



## IOWA

Charter members in the Iowa Hawkeye Horseshoe Hall of Fame includes four former World Champions — Frank Jackson, Kellerton; Frank Lunden, New London; Putt Mossman, Eldora and Guy Zimmerman, Sac City. Others are Lucille Hopkins, Ottumwa; Leland Martensen, Des Moines; and Dale Dixon, Des Moines. The first inductees joined in 1976.

Cliff Kenney over the past six seasons has pitched 726 tournament games against 253 different opponents. Cliff figures he has thrown 54 ton of iron and walked 174 miles during these fun times.

1987 Hall of Fame inductee Muriel Maurer, directs four tournaments at the county fairgrounds each year...and takes some time out to explain the finer points of the game to interested spectators around the circuit.

## MICHIGAN

According to records sent by the Wolverine Newsletter, Roy Smith of Muskegon recorded the highest percentage over the years—an 80% tournament in 1977. He won his first one in 1962, the last one in 1982. Also winning 13 titles was Joe Latzko of Flint. Ed Walls, Ken Jensen and Doc Maison each captured five championships. The present champion, Robert "Ozzie" Williams from Cement City has won three — 1984, 1985 and 1989. Walls is from Detroit; Jensen, St. Joseph and Maison, Warren. The first champion was Lewis Wilkes from Battle Creek, the 1923 winner.

Jean Swarthout is the dean in ladies circles, having won six titles, the first in 1971, the last in 1982. Three ladies have won three championships — Sandy Wohlgemuth, 3 straight, 1976-78; Sandy Smith, 1985-87; and Ann Wedel, 1980, 1983 and 1984. Wedel from Fulton has the highest tournament percentage, 72.8 in 1984. Dorothy Falk of Roseville won the 1989 title with a 61.7 figure. Darlene Swanson won the first ladies title in 1961.

## EASTERN NEBRASKA

Omaha certainly deserves the opening story in the 1990's. They now have about 150 new card carrying members. This should easily make 1990 a record year. Thanks to an indoor facility and sanctioned league.

Tournament directors hashed out a schedule with no tournaments within 100 miles of each other on the same day. Eastern Nebraska also fits well with western Iowa.

Thanks to Walter Ray Williams Jr., Ainsworth now has a Middle of Nowhere Days for pitching horseshoes and bowling. The term came from a remark made by Walter Ray on TV during a pro bowling interview...He said he was leaving to participate in the World Tournament in the "Middle of Nowhere".

## NEW JERSEY

Art Tyson, of New York, Bill MacIntyre and Joe Shultz finished one-two-three in both the Thanksgiving Tournament and New Year's Tournament at Pottersville. Tyson finished with percentages of 71.0 and 71.5. In the February affair indoors at Pottersville, Lou Testa won Class A and Bill Gurgurich won in Class B.

MacIntyre turned the tables on Tyson in the Sugar

Bowl and President's Day Tournaments. MacIntyre closed with 71.2 and 72.5 percentages winning nine in a row in the first and going 9-1 in the second. Both pitchers had 91.6 games in the President's Tournament.

There are 29 pitchers in the State's Hall of Fame including Sol Berman (1973), Phil Zozzaro (1974) and Vince Yannetti, former NHPA Vice President.

## OREGON

As National Publicity Chairman, your writer is encouraged about action in Oregon. Roger Christianson has been appointed to the job of Publicity Director in place of Lee Wallace, who has moved to Florida. Roger writes: "I would like to encourage all of our clubs to appoint a Publicity Director to work with me and let me know who they are. I also would like to hear from you if you have any good ideas for promoting horseshoe pitching in our state."

Jerry Gorton, Pleasant Hill; Joe Grube, Corvallis and Chet Sergeant, Portland, won A, B and C in the Wren Open, December 2. The tournament was hosted by the Oregon City Horseshoe Club. Lowell Davis, Creswell O.D. Loy, Corvallis, captured the Wren Open hosted by the Vancouver Horseshoe Club.

## PENNSYLVANIA

Francis E. White, Eric Horseshoe Club publicity chairman, sends the following note concerning the 45th Annual Eastern National horseshoe tournament scheduled for Erie June 23 and 24. Deadline is June 13th. Send entries to Clarence Butcher, 3825 Garden Avenue, Erie, 16508. Total 144 pitchers.

Money prizes will be substantially increased this year for the tournament on the 20 clay courts. Art Tyson from New York is the defending champion, having won the tournament the last two years.

## TEXAS

Will Wade won the Lost Pines Spring Classic at Bastrop March 10 edging Coke Bowker by one game. The Class B winner was Tommy Valenta. # Phyllis Negaard

**H**ow lucky can one get? Better yet, how can one person be so good and lucky at the same time?

Five time World Champion Phyllis Negaard from St. Joseph, Minnesota really hit the jackpot in 1989. She won her fifth Women's World Championship title since 1977, was inducted into the NHPA Hall of Fame, and won her 13th Minnesota State Title. That's more good than lucky.

It is an unbelievable accomplishment for the dedicated pitcher from the Gopher State. Many had the feeling all year that Phyllis wanted the 1989 title badly and worked hard to bring her fifth title back to the Land of Lakes.

Phyllis began pitching like most other folks who pitch for fun and hamburgers at family gatherings and picnics. But unlike those thousands who enjoy fun outings, her competitive spirit began to emerge when Ronn, her husband of 26 years, and Phyllis found out there were organized horseshoe tournaments. They entered that first tournament in 1976 and she pitched along with the men at 40 feet.

In 1976 Minnesota held its first women's division and Phyllis entered only a few months after she started to pitch. A surprising, but not earth-shattering performance 39.5% was good enough to win her first of 13 state titles. She won 11 consecutive championships before losing to sister Bev Nathe in 1988.

After that first win, it didn't take much to get Phyllis "hooked" on the sport. The Negaards collected all the information available about horseshoes, studied Ottie Reno's book from cover to cover several times and started practicing as soon as Minnesota weather permitted. Her goal was 50%, and practice two to three hours a day produced results. Goals have been synonymous with the "champ." They are set to achieve and she certainly has been an over-achiever during her career.

Although worried that she would not do well at her first world at Greenville, Ohio in 1977, those worries vanished with a 58% qualifying round and an 8th place finish in Class "C." With determination and

much practice, Phyllis reached the Championship Class in 1978. But, 1979 was a magic year for Phyllis. She met her idol, 10-time World Champion, Ted Allen. He agreed to give her his autograph, but for the lack of proper paper, he opted to autograph her pitching arm. Phyllis won the title that year and is not sure whether the autograph or her mysterious cheering section of one, who became excited and fell off the bleachers and needed medical attention, was the answer.

The Allen Autograph story continued the next year as the former great requested a "Phyllis Negaard Autograph"...on his arm, no less. "It was embarrassing," said the modest champion, "but one does not refuse greatness."

Her sixth straight State title came in 1981, when the "automatic" champion nailed an 85.67 percentage, her lifetime best tournament. It is a state record for 11 games. While we are on record setting games, Phyllis set a World record of 95.2 in 1982 only to break it herself in 1983, when as the defending champion she won her third World and in doing so, broke the single game mark with a 95.8. As we all know, records are set to be broken, and Debbie Pickering from New Hampshire now holds the single game World mark of 96.5, set in 1987 at Eau Claire.

There is a saying that bad practice or poor qualifying often means a good tournament. This happened at Ainsworth in 1986. Qualifying in the Nebraska heat, Negaard was seeded ninth. During the break before championship play, son Randy and Phyllis headed for the Black Hills. Ronn restrained the wife from tossing her "disgusting pair" of horseshoes in the Missouri River during the trip. Coming back from her disappointment in the qualifying round, the "champ" won her fourth World with a 14-1, 79.3% performance and decided to keep the shoes. Her 11th State title came over the Labor Day weekend plus the special honor when inducted into the Minnesota Gopher State Horseshoe Pitchers Hall of Fame.

Competition in the Women's Championship Class is very keen and there have been years when



Phyllis could not fight off the determination of others. 1985 was such a year when in Lafayette, she finished 7th. Phyllis bounced back to win her 4th World Title at Ainsworth in 1986 averaging 79.3 percent with 14 wins in 15 games. Two poor years followed when she finished 6th at Eau Claire in 1987 and then dropped to 11th place in 1988 at Pleasanton and a few weeks later lost her State title as well.

After the sad 1988, Phyllis reviewed past performances, studied some videos and spotted several things she had changed in her delivery. In addition, she decided to forego league play in favor of practice for longer periods of time. With Boni Boser, Ginger O'Brien and sisters Sandy Karasch and Bev Nathe as sparring partners, she was not lacking top-notch competition.

Determined to reach the top again, Phyllis set a goal to win the 1989 World. At Spearfish, she climaxed her performance on Television defeating 1987 Champion Sandy McLachlin from Canada in the ESPN TV finals, 25-15. She reached the finals of the ladder-type play by defeating Lois Webster, 24-18. In both the finals action, Phyllis nailed like percentages of 82.5, making the complete tournament figure 80.8, her third highest in World competition. She hit 84.1 in 1983 in winning the title at Statesville, North Carolina and 82.5 in 1984 when she finished second behind Tari Powell at Huntsville.

1989 was probably destined to be a great year. On March 21, at 1:20 (she will never forget the date and time) an unbelievable call from the White House — the one in Washington D.C. — asking if Minnesota's best would like to visit the Capital with several other World Champions and pitch horseshoes with the President on April 1. An April Fool's joke, she thought, but NHPA President Dave Loucks confirmed the invitation.

Phyllis recalls: "The President and Mrs. Bush were so wonderful and treated us like royalty. I shall always remember the visit as one of the most thrilling experiences of my life."

It was the beginning of a great year and the "triple" was hers...fifth World Title, 13th State crown and in-

duction into the NHPA Hall of Fame.

In 1980 Phyllis had asked NHPA Secretary-Treasurer Donnie Roberts: "How do you get into the NHPA Hall of Fame?" The reply rings true: "Just win a few World titles, and if you're lucky you could make it."

The Negaards can't live solely on pitching horseshoes. They have a business to run. Their business,

"Negaard's Lettering Inc." is also flourishing. A 12-year old embroidery firm, they do lettering for all types of business including large corporate firms — logos, shirts, jackets, caps, etc. are produced for shipment world wide. They donated jackets and caps for the presidential couple and the group who visited the White House in April last year.

Art Sperber of Bremerton, who recently published an idea for use as a poster, is forming an organization of reps from local clubs of the Northwest in order to exchange ideas about publicity and other ways of promoting horseshoes. He will spread ideas, etc. with mailings 4-6 times each year.

### WEST VIRGINIA

Fairmont's Charles Bunner captured the Class A title in the Tri-County YMCA horseshoe tournament in March. Tom Tuskan was second. Ken Stevenson of Farmington won Class B with Jim Nice of Reedsville second.

The Class C winner was Davis Woodward of Fairmont. Paul Andy, also of Fairmont was second. The Class D titlest was Bob Roadman from Vanderbilt. In second place was Joe Fairmont of Fairmont.

The Marion County Parks and Recreation presented a sketch of a plan for the ideal use of the land at the Paw Paw Fairgrounds. Plans for the park call for the early completion of several horseshoe courts and a ball

# Sanctioned Club/League News by Bev Born

At this writing, I'm already trying to get the red & yellow CL/LG guide books updated, as going to a full NHPA requirement does mandate a few changes in these books.

There will also be a few revisions needed on some of the report forms, even though we will continue to use the old ones, until present stocks are gone. Basically the space provided for ordering CL/LG cards on the request for sanction and material request forms, the dues column on membership reports and the column for CL/LG card numbers on the final state sheets, will all be deleted. If some of the old forms are still being used next year, I will try to black out these deletions and on ones that a club has on hand, the director will need to ignore them or write for new forms.

Another major change, as of the first of January, will be that no club will send money for dues or insurance fees to this office. All membership cards will be purchased/issued through your state /charter. Since this process varies from state to state, with some distributing cards to club officials, reg. directors, etc., the means by which your members receive their cards could vary. In Oklahoma all NHPA cards are issued by the charter secretary only. Therefore all club members order their cards individually or their club directors collect the fees and order cards for their members, sending the names, addresses, and phone numbers, along with the correct amount of state/NHPA and insurance fees to the charter sec/treas. Since all of the cards are filled out, all the director must do is see that each individual receives their card. The club director then lists all members and all card numbers on the CL/LG membership form, sending the white copy to the national director, the yellow copy to their charter secretary, keeping the

pink copy for club records.

Even though no fees will come to the national director, a complete membership report must still be sent to this office as soon as possible after their season/league begins. This is still mandatory, each year, to activate the club's sanction. These reports must be kept current and up to date throughout the entire year/season. If new members join after the first report has been sent, then report number two, three, etc. must be sent in. Each member should be listed only once, on only one member report per year, always keeping these reports current. If a pitcher's name should appear on the club's final stat sheets or on the top ten form and that person is not on a current membership report, they will not receive any awards through this program for that year and will be considered a non-member. The club's first yearly membership report should be sent to this office, within two to three weeks after actual league play has begun. It is very important that club directors remember that these membership reports are mandatory to renew/reactivate the club's sanction every year, as they are verification that all members are fully paid "full" NHPA card holders.

If any club fails to submit their annual membership report each year, the club's sanction will be automatically cancelled as of January first. Notice of this official cancellation will be published in *Newsline* and sent to these clubs. After a club receives this notice, they will then lose all previous years of being in the program and a new sanction will not be issued for a period of at least one year from that date.

In the past I have tried to be very fair to delinquent clubs, reinstating their sanctions long after a new year had begun, sending out notices that

their reports had not been received and that I had received no contact from them. "As of January 1991, I will no longer do this" for any club, under any circumstances.

When there are 15 to 30 delinquent clubs each year, some of them being so year after year, it becomes very time consuming and costly. It will be up to each club director (my contact person) to see that their club's reports are sent in a timely and accurate manner and it is the director's responsibility to do right by all of the club's members and not deprive any of them from receiving an earned and deserved award.

If a club's director changes for any reason during the year, the club should vote to leave the program or, if they are having problems, it would be greatly appreciated if some member would contact me, ASAP. Even though I do try very hard to work and understand everyone and their individual situations, I cannot help a club or person that will not correspond with me. In all cases, changes in administration, formats of play, membership, problems, uncertainties or questions about any part of this program's requirements, should be directed to this office, before "mole hills become mountains".

I'm aware that some parts of this article are a repeat of my May article, but these subjects are of dire importance and do bare repeating in preparing for the 1991 season.

I am looking forward to seeing a lot of old friends and to meeting new ones at Stone Mountain and want to wish all a safe trip and good pitching. All interested persons are extended an invitation to attend the sanctioned CL/LG meeting, date, time and place will be posted. With lots of meetings available, covering many aspects of the NHPA and a long convention, I leave you with this thought. "A fuss is a display of ignorance, a discussion is a display of intelligent ideas" and "no one will ever be successful, taking things personally."

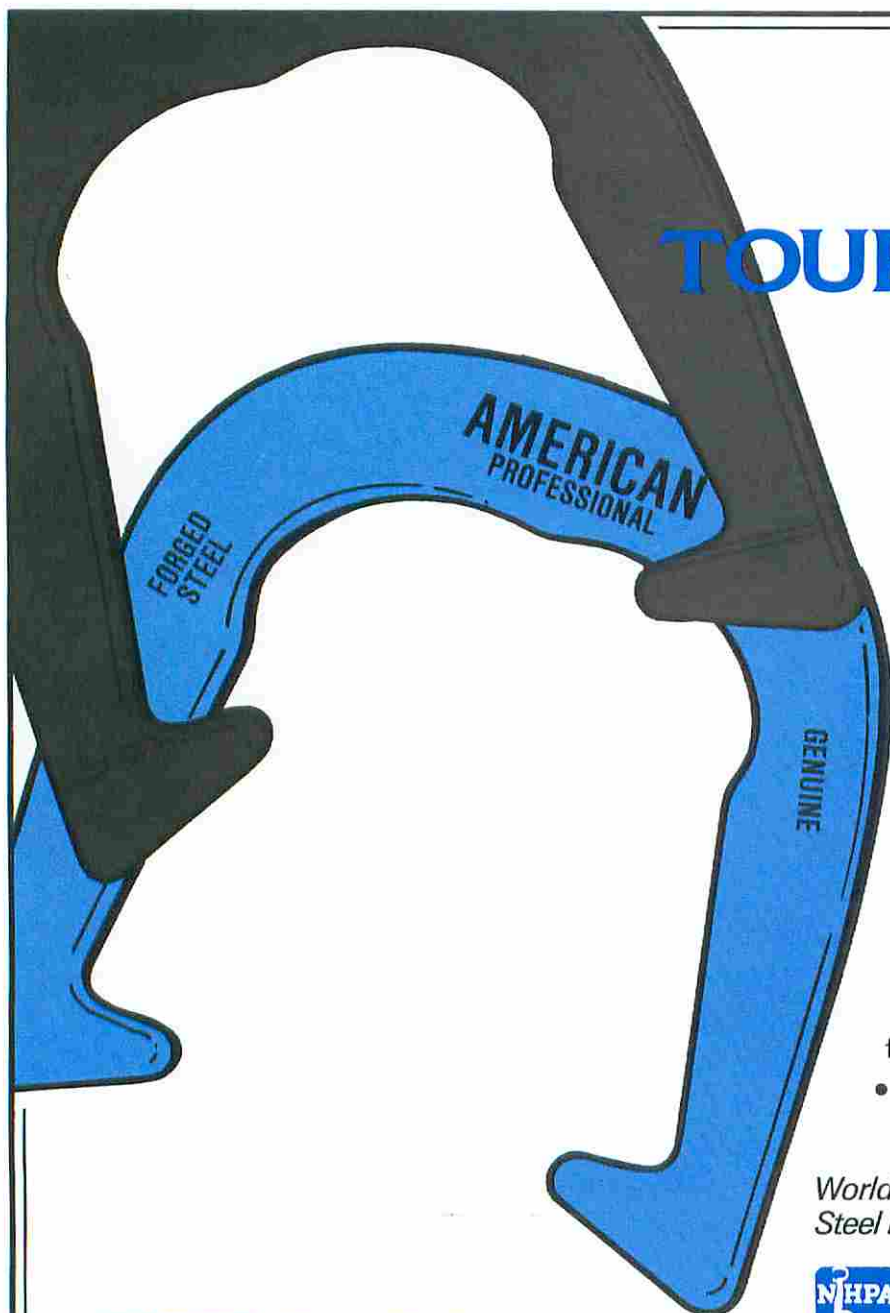
