



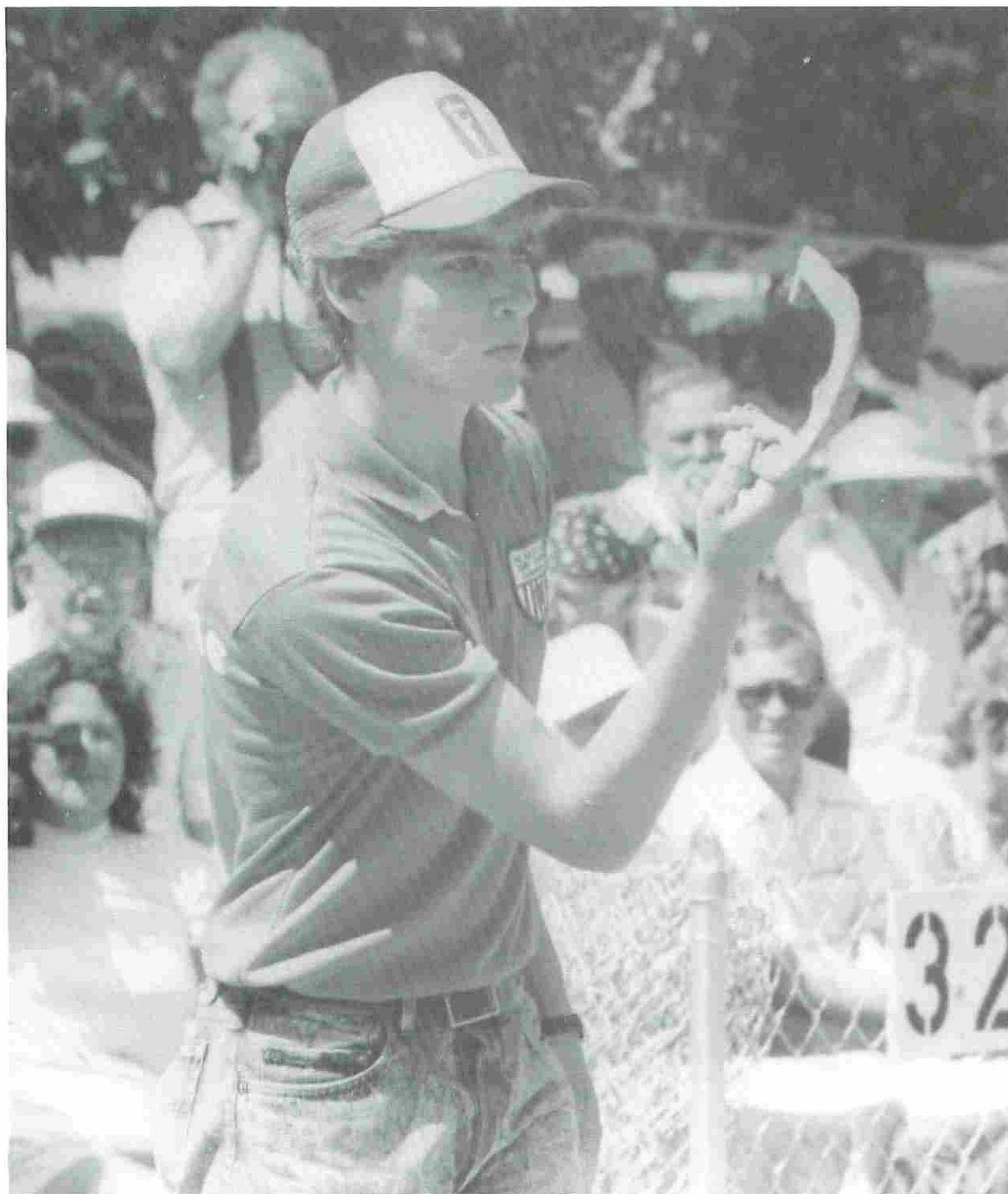

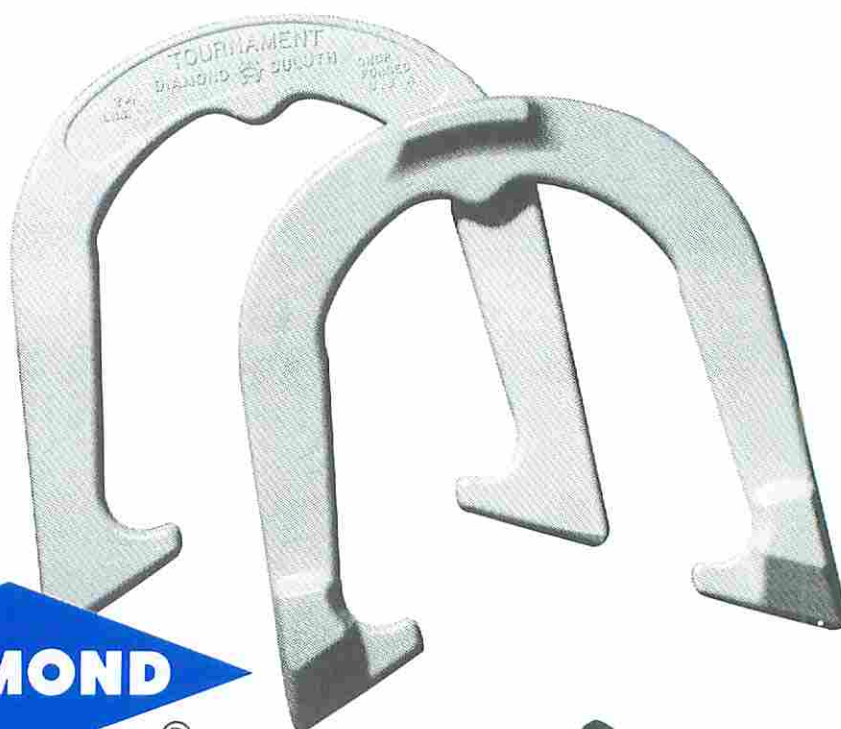

President's Message

Two months ago, in the March issue, I touched on the subject of *communication* and how I would like to use this magazine as a means to a better informed membership. There is a proposal to be considered by the delegates this year that would include the magazine as part of each NHPA annual dues. It has been discussed before and I'm sure this year's proposal will bring a lot more heated debate to the convention floor.

There are many ways to exchange information, but for our membership, I cannot think of a better way than through *Newsline*. Certainly there is no less expensive way to stay current of National horseshoe pitching activities on a regular basis. About one half of our charters have some sort of newsletter that is available to state members. Like *Newsline* however, many of these are by individual subscription, which makes it very difficult to convey information to all. These state newsletters do not replace or duplicate the NHPA *Newsline*, but rather support the entire association's need to *communicate*.

Every week brings many letters and phone calls from members who have a question on one subject or another. I am constantly surprised by how many of the questions are on subjects that have been discussed in *Newsline* or are a part of NHPA published rules or our Constitution & By-Laws. When I inquire of the person if they get *Newsline* or have seen our other published data, the answer is almost always NO! Some are not even aware that the NHPA has a publication. Occasionally, I'm able to wrestle a new sub-

scription but more times than not, I'm disappointed by the individual's lack of interest to pursue anything other than their immediate question.

We have just about finished a campaign to ensure that all NHPA Regional Directors are *Newsline* subscribers. Regional Directors are very important to us and like most NHPA positions, their work pays very little and often goes unnoticed. It is, however, vital to our growth that all RD's stay informed so that the information they impart is the latest available to them. In the same vein, it is just as important that all Charter Officers are informed and in turn, communicate to their members. Unfortunately, there are still many charter officers who do not subscribe to *Newsline* and even more who do not pass what information they have on to state members. The result is that we try to work with a communication gap that is sometimes very hard to span. This is especially so in the newer charters that have officers who lack longevity in the game and/or the NHPA. Even some of the older charters who find their officers in a constant state of flux, have a continual communication problem.

A *Newsline* magazine to all NHPA members will not solve all communication problems. Certainly, as editor and chief bottle washer, I don't relish having to handle five times as many magazines as I do now. However, the fact remains that no better source is available to us to spread the word and improve the biggest problem in the NHPA...

■ The Easter Seal fund raising tournament scheduled for May 26-27 in Woodhaven, Michigan has had a change in pitching sites. A very strong windstorm damaged the Wonder Dome beyond repair and the tournament site has been changed to Lincoln Park Community Center. ■ Gene & Yvonne Ficek, directors of the 1989 Spearfish World Tournament, have reported that the Spearfish Jaycees turned over \$4200 to the local high school Scholarship Fund to be used as a perpetual scholarship bank for Spearfish High School graduates. This money was raised from the beer garden sales at last year's tournament. A special thanks to the Jaycees, Gene & Yvonne, and all the pitchers and supporters who made this possible.

■ The 1991 World Police and Fire Games will be held June 22-30, 1991 in Memphis, Tennessee. Horseshoe pitching will be one of the sports and 12 new courts are planned for installation at Challey Farm Park which will remain after the games. Regional Director, Dexter Stallings and some Tennessee State members will be assisting in this project.

■ The recent, unexpected deaths of Ted Allen and Will Gullickson, both members of the NHPA Hall of Fame Committee, meant that two replacements had to be found. I'm pleased to announce that the new appointees are

Ralph Dykes of Illinois and Charles Killgore of Missouri.

■ The World Tournament increase to \$50.00 for entry will allow us to put our most prestigious event on a par to reach \$100,000 in prize money and help to attract more media attention. All of the increase will be given back to the respective classes who will find their prize money nearly doubled. None of the increase will go to the championship groups who will still have to pay a finals fee while class finalists will not.

■ I wrote to President Bush and extended an invitation to visit us at the 1990 Stone Mountain World Tournament. A personal reply from the president said, "Dear Dave, I've thrown the first pitch at a couple of baseball season openers, but pitching the first shoe at a world tournament would be a new experience. You were great to ask and my scheduling office will let you know if my schedule will permit me to attend."

Editor's note: For security reasons this decision may not be made until the last moment.

■ For many, an 80% game is only a dream. For Walter Ray Williams, it is commonplace. In a recent tournament in Turlock, CA, Walter's low game was 84%. He lost it and finished 2nd to Don Titcomb. For the tournament, Walter averaged a sizzling 90.8%. His high game was 98% when he threw 49 ringers out of 50 shoes.

Mr. Loucks,

In the March issue of *Newsline* you stated that the NHPA is losing money on the publishing of same. There is an article in Letters to the Editor from Francis White of Erie, PA in regards to tournament results. I'm of the same opinion as Mr. White on 10½ pages of names and percentage figures — WHO CARES? Every person who pitches in a tournament knows what he/she did, it doesn't need further publication other than major contests such as World and State Championships, elimination of these would have to reduce publishing costs.

As participant in the Showboat Tournament, I do not understand how the NHPA can sanction something that violates their own rules; that being the size of a court. Rule 4, section B states the minimum landing area of a shoe will be 31" wide by 43" long. Rule 9, section A states a shoe hitting the backstop is a foul shoe, NO SCORE, how can we condone using an area of 24" by 24"

with scoring one or more points on shoes that have passed the 40' stake distance and returned off of a backstop to a scoring position. It seems to me this could lead to every local area making their own rules and eventually undermining all the work of the NHPA that has been put forth over the years. Thank you for listening to my complaints.

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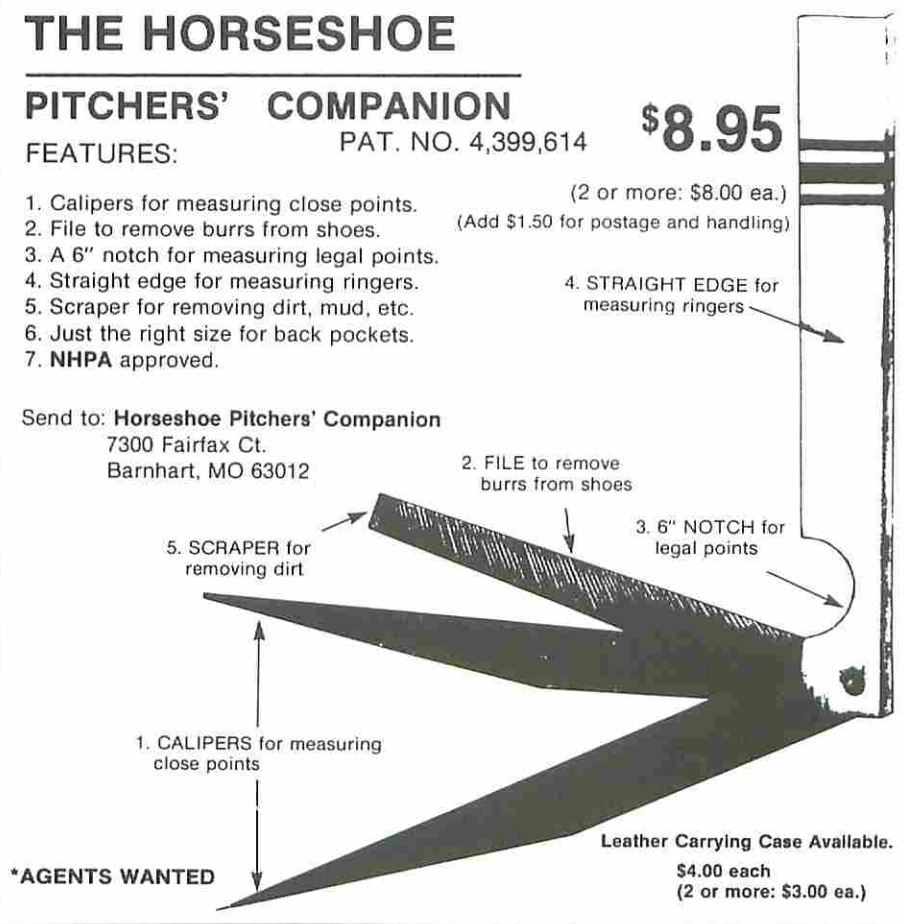
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Proposed NHPA Rule Changes

The NHPA Rules Committee, consisting of 15 association members appointed by the president has, during the last year, discussed and considered many proposed changes and additions. Seventeen proposals have been approved to come before the delegates for further discussion and vote. Those 17 are listed below. In each case, the page, rule and section number mentioned is a referral to the yellow NHPA Rules Brochure, last revised 1/1/89.

1. Page 1, Section A Eliminate the second paragraph.
Effect - Eliminates the warning.

2. Page 1, Section A
If we vote to keep this paragraph — Move it into Rule 9.
Effect - Puts it in the proper section of the Rulebook.

3. Page 1, Section G Rewrite it to read — In Regional and State Championships, all first place ties must be played off. Ties for other places shall be decided by playoff, percentage, or who-beat-who. In all other sanctioned tournaments, ties for any position may be settled by playoff, percentage, who-beat-who or, if count-all is used, total points. In any playoff situation, the method of play and length of game shall be decided by the Tournament Committee.

Effect — Defines playoff method for State and Regional events. It also allows local charters more autonomy for their own events when weather and time are important factors.

4. Page 2, Section B Rewrite the first sentence and first part of the second sentence to read —

Pitching stakes for women, juniors, handicapped, and 70+ men who choose to do so shall be 30 feet apart, with a foul line three feet in front of each stake. When 30 foot pitchers play on a court constructed for men...

Effect — Better language.

5. Rule 2, Section C Rewrite to read — A 70+ man shall declare himself to be either a 30 foot pitcher or a 40 foot pitcher and establish his percentage at either one distance or the other.

Effect — Better language and clarification.

6. Rule 4, Section E Rewrite to read — The material in the pit shall be watered (if necessary) and leveled by the contestants before a game begins. (Contestants may have someone do this job for them.) During a contest, contestants cannot mash or move the material around the stake and the material cannot be shoveled unless approved by a tournament official. The only exception to this rule is for courts with sand or sandy loam material. They may be leveled, as needed, throughout the course of the contest.

Effect — Allows contestants to fill in the holes in sand or sandy loam pits.

7. Rule 5, Section B Insert between the first and second sentences in parentheses — If a stake breaks as a result of the fourth shoe in the inning and both pitchers agree as to the results of that inning, then it may be counted.

Effect — Since the frame is completed, it should be counted if there is no doubt as to how it should be scored.

8. Rule 6, Section B Move it to the end of Rule 9 Section A. The wording would change if #1 does not pass. If #1

passes, the wording would stay as it is now.

Effect — Puts it in the proper place in the rules.

9. Rule 6, Section C

Move it to become the first sentence of Rule 8 Section C.

Effect — Puts it in the proper place in the rules.

10. Rule 7, Section E Rewrite to read — A contestant, while not pitching, shall remain on the opposite side of the stake and behind his/her opponent. A 30 foot pitcher shall remain three feet behind his/her opponent but shall not return to the rear of the court unless the opponent is a 40 foot pitcher. A contestant shall remain stationary and silent while his/her opponent is pitching.

Effect — Does not require a 40 foot pitcher to stay in contact with the opposite platform while the opponent is pitching. Defines proper decorum for a contestant while an opponent is pitching.

11. Rule 8, Section D Change the penalty to read — Both shoes shall be declared foul for that inning.

Effect — Changes to a less severe penalty.

12. Rule 8, Section F Rewrite to read — A shoe which strikes a foreign object (such as an animal) while in flight to or landing in the pit shall be pitched over. A shoe which strikes a tree limb, electrical wire, ceiling of an indoor facility or other object which has been there all along shall not be repitched.

Effect — Better wording.

13. Rule 8, Section H Rewrite the last sentence to read — If the contestants fail to discover the error until after all four shoes have been pitched, the inning shall be scored on the basis of what shoes they pitched. If they fail to come to agreement, the frame shall be repitched.

Effect — Each contestant is sure to be credited with the shoes he/she pitched.

14. Rule 11 Rewrite to read — An official (legal) shoe shall be NHPA sanctioned and approved. It shall not exceed 7 1/4 inches in width, ... (keep as is) ... not exceed 3 1/2 inches.

Add as a second paragraph — An "altered" shoe is a shoe changed by adding to (or subtracting from) it any feature such as a caulk, notch, weight, etc. that would make it different from its original design. An "altered" shoe is illegal. Penalty — Forfeiture of all games played.

Effect — Further defines legal and illegal shoes. Defines an "altered" shoe and the penalty for using one.

15. Rule 12, Section A Add on —

and shall be made to the closest part of the stake.

Effect — Makes sure the measurement goes to the closest part of the stake and not necessarily parallel to the ground.

16. Rule 12, Section C Rewrite to read — A ringer is declared when the shoe encircles the stake far enough to allow a straight-edge to touch both heel caulks and clear the stake or when the straight-edge touches both heel caulks and the stake simultaneously.

Effect — Makes the "three-pointer" a ringer.

17. Horseshoe Court Layout on Page 8

Add the forward foul line to it.

Effect — Makes the diagram more complete.

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For A Healthy Pitch

My knee is bothering me." "My neck is stiff." "I don't pitch well in the morning (or in the evening, cool weather, rain, after a break, after keeping score, etc.) because of my arthritis." "It takes me a long time to warm up." etc., etc., etc. All of these statements and many other like them have one thing in common... Most horseshoe pitchers are, like the general population, not in real terrific physical shape. We tend to expect our bodies to respond to our commands perfectly even if we only pitch shoes at weekend tournaments and even though we do very little else to keep them running smoothly.

How do we fix this with a minimum of effort? It's not that difficult but it does take a little thought and time, which is well worth it, especially when we can see results pretty quickly in some cases.

First, we have to realize that everyone, even young people, should warm up before undertaking any activity. You may think that horseshoe pitching is not strenuous enough to need a warm-up. How-

ever, any activity that is repeated literally hundreds of times, such as pitching in a normal tournament, requires a warm-up. Warming up helps get the circulation going and increases the blood supply and the heat in your muscles and joints. That will help prevent muscle strains and pain. So, first of all, we must warm up before we begin pitching. How?

A brisk walk at least twice around the perimeter of the horseshoe courts will help a lot. Swinging those arms back and forth while walking (without the horseshoes) will help. Taking several lunging steps on both legs will also help. Some gentle *shallow* knee bends while waiting for your court will not look unusual and will help. Any activity after you get out of your car and before you begin pitching is good.

The next thing to think about seriously is trying to get yourself in better physical shape overall. You may have heard of cardiovascular fitness. Cardiovascular fitness is not just muscular strength but it is fitness of the heart, lungs, and circulatory

system. It is accomplished by some kind of continuous exercise such as walking, swimming, or biking which you do for a minimum of 20 minutes at least 3 times a week. By taking the time to do something like this, you are helping yourself to a healthier life, better weight control, perhaps even blood pressure and cholesterol control. In addition, this kind of exercise can relieve stress. People who exercise regularly have more tolerance for the exercise and for the excitement of competition.

What to do about the chronic injury such as a bad back or a bad leg? If you have pain in any area, you should first have it checked out by a physician or a sports medicine clinic to be sure it is not dangerous. Then you should request some exercises to strengthen the muscles around the area of injury or pain. If you get the OK for exercises, and if you do them, you will be increasing the muscular support around the problem area and you will probably notice less discomfort. Best exercises for a simple low back strain are abdominal exercises. However, the old leg lifts are OUT! IN is the exercise in which you lie down on the floor with your knees bent, place your arms across your chest, and curl just your head and shoulders up off the floor. That's all you need to do. Do it as many times as you are able to and even more than once a day if you can — the abdominal muscles are the only muscles that don't need a full day's rest between exercise. Out on the horseshoe court, try to bend your knees to pick up your horseshoes instead of leaning over. That puts a tremendous strain on the back. Also, when your horseshoe is stuck in that clay, use the other horseshoe as a lever to pry it out instead of trying to yank it out with those poorly designed back muscles.

This is a real quick overview of the "getting fit to pitch" pitch. If you have any questions or want some more detail about anything, write to *Newsline* with your question and I'll try to answer. Our sport has a lot to offer people of all ages, so we have to look and feel as good as possible to be its ambassadors.

Perhaps I should feel a little consolation in the fact that there were 30 sanctions cancelled in 1989, compared to only 18 this year. Helping to offset the cancellations were twelve new clubs joining the program for 1990. One is from the state of Kansas, which has had no sanctioned club for several years. May all the new ones and old ones be with us for many years to come.

With the upcoming change in the program dues structure, the red book (CL/LG Guide Book) will be rewritten sometime this year. Hopefully, it will be available for distribution at the W.T. with a copy of the

new edition being sent to all sanctioned clubs before the first of the year. The membership report forms will be revised to delete the dues column, but all NHPA card numbers of all club members will still be required. Reports received without all card numbers will be returned as incomplete. No patches or awards will be sent to any club until a completed membership report is received for the current year. This verification that all members have paid their current NHPA dues/ins. fees will be mandatory.

Please, encourage your members to order their "full" NHPA cards for the next year as early as possible, so as not to hold up your reports. Your club's first membership report should still be sent to this office, just as early in the year as possible, followed by report #2, 3, etc., as needed to assure that all members are reported. Any pitcher's name that is not on the current member report and comes in on a final stat or top ten form, will not be recognized to receive any awards.

In 1991 all sanctioned club members will pay their NHPA fees to and receive their cards from their state/charter secretaries. Your CL/LG director may arrange with the charter secretary, if they choose, to have cards on hand to sell or just collect the fees and order all cards at once. In any case, the canary copy of the three-part membership report must be sent to the charter secretary, to either have them fill in the NHPA card numbers issued, or get a record of the names and numbers issued by the CL/LG director. This is so the state secretaries can send in their reports and fees owed to the NHPA secretary. If any of you have any questions or need help on this, please contact me. Even though it is still some seven months away, it never hurts to be prepared ahead of time.

May this be the very best season for all with an increase in ringers — for everyone!

St. Moritz Horseshoe Club 78-C-59



I first joined the St. Moritz Club in 1973 and the Massachusetts HPA the following year. I was elected president of the St. Moritz Club in 1976, succeeding Russ Gadoury, the originator of the Sanction CL/LG program. In 1978 (our first year of sanction) I became the club's secretary, which I still am, along with being treasurer in 1989. I keep track of player's averages, handicaps and ringer percentages each week. At the end of the season we have a club tournament followed by a member/family cook-out, at which we elect new officers and hand out the awards received from the Sanctioned CL/LG program.

I am vice president of the New England HPA, compiling percentage stats of all players from the six New England states, a copy of which is sent to all club directors in the fall after all tournaments have been completed.

When Ed Domey had his "Heritage Recreation Center" I kept the stats for the Tuesday night league and compiled averages and results for all members of his club, receiving a plaque and certificate for doing this.

At the present, I am compiling a World Tournament record book. I would like to praise the efforts of recent historians for the fine job they've done. Dave Loucks, *Newsline* creator; Kevin Cone, who can forget *Ringers Remembered?*; Walter Ray Williams Jr., our original modern day statistician; and Bob Champion, creator of Colorado's *Double Ringer* publication. If their time permits, I will be asking these gentlemen for special help in their field of expertise. I would also like to acknowledge two unofficial historians, Stu Snyder and Glen Portt for the fine features they share with us.

We would like to publish year-by-

year finishes of our star pitchers, like one-sided baseball cards. If you have ever pitched in the Championship Class, send a photo to *Newsline* with your name on the back. Don't be shy. Retired old timers would also be appreciated.

Many *Newsliners* would like to improve their pitching performances so we will print pitching tips. Everyone isn't lucky enough to have a Glenn Riffle or Don Titcomb as a tutor. While writing the book on the history of the World Tournament, Ted Allen and I spent many hours on the telephone confirming many historical facts. I mentioned to Ted how I read his many articles on how to pitch horseshoes and would he mind if I shared this information. He told me someday he might write a book and asked me to suppress this information until he died. Soon the lessons will begin. I'm sure Ted

would like it.

In 1928 our first NHPA statistician D.D. Cottrell wrote a book called "Horseshoe Pitching - How to Play the Game." In our first feature, a story of this Hall of Famer will be told. Before we start I'd like to mention our first reference of horseshoe pitching was made by the Duke of Wellington complaining "the Colonial War was lost to pitchers of horse hardware on the village greens!" Both sides in this war pitched horseshoes. While researching Ohio's 1916 State Tournament it was learned Ohio's Joseph Warner was Battalion Champion at Gettysburg. Bill Smith of Stow, Ohio sent me a copy of Civil War horseshoe pitching shown in Time-Life's *History of the War*. Some of this is mentioned in D.D. Cottrell's "History of Horseshoe Pitching" which I hope you enjoy.

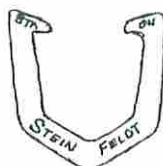
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History of Horseshoe Pitching

The Encyclopedia Britannica says that as early as the second century before the Christian Era, iron plates or rings for shoes were nailed on horses' feet in western Asia and eastern Europe. This practice however, did not find its way to western Europe until the fifth century A.D. and was not in regular use until the Middle Ages.

In Greece and Rome, athletic contests of different kinds generally formed some part of a religious observance or festival. One of the four Grecian national festivals was the Olympian games which was established in very early times and today is still called by the same name.

These Grecian games consisted of boxing, putting the weight, archery, chariot races and discus throwing. The discus was similar to the modern quoit but not in size and weight. It originally was a circular plate of metal or stone, 10-12 inches in diameter, and was pitched or thrown with a strap or thong passed through a hole in the center, the strap being released by the player as he swung it so the discus would go to the greatest possible distance.

Camp followers of the Grecian armies who could not afford the discus took discarded horseshoes and pounded them together in the shape of a discus and used them in games like their more well-to-do superiors. The camp followers are believed to have gotten too lazy to pound their old horseshoes together in the form of a discus to throw and set up a stake and began throwing just the old horseshoe rings at it. Somewhere along the line, the game was changed to include two stakes but the time of this change is undocumented. We do know that horseshoe pitching had its origin in the game of quoits and that quoits is a modification of the old Grecian game of discus throwing.

The rules of the game of quoits seemed to vary greatly until the mid 19th century. In 1869, the game

became very popular in England and a set of rules were drawn up to govern the game. The distance between the pegs was 19 yards and the player stood level with the peg and had to deliver his quoit with his first step. While no requirement for weight was established, the outside diameter could not be more than 8 inches. All measurements for points were taken between the nearest parts of both the quoit and peg. Each player delivered both his quoits, followed by his opponent. These became the rules under which the game was played in the United States but it was much easier to find discarded horseshoes and pitch them. Thus, horseshoe pitching became the more popular game.

During the Revolutionary War, horseshoe pitching became a favorite sport of both the British soldiers and the Continental Army. This is documented by historic pictures of blacksmith shops showing a game of horseshoes being played. The game seems to have been a favorite among

soldiers in most wars, but during the Civil War, it was played in earnest as many a company had its champion pitcher. Contests between the best pitchers of different companies and regiments were common. The Spanish American War soldiers took up the game and it became one of their more popular sports. These soldiers, returning home to all parts of the country, kept the interest in the game going and soon horseshoe courts were being laid out in cities, villages and farming communities all over the land. The hot bed of horseshoe pitching at the start of this century seemed to be centered in the Kansas City area with every hamlet or village within 100 miles having its local champion. Horseshoe pitching was getting serious as contests were staged between teams representing different cities as they got together on the clay courts in Convention Hall, Kansas City, MO., in 1900 and again at Independence, MO., in 1902.

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Alan Francis

Most of us have heard the expression "Youth must be served." In the case of Alan Francis from Blythe-dale, Missouri, youth served up a batch of ringers last year to defeat defending champion Jim Knisley, of Ohio, on ESPN TV and win the 1989 men's World Horseshoe pitching championship at Spearfish, South Dakota.

Had Buddy Ebsen of television's Beverly Hillbillies been around at Pleasanton when Alan defeated former World champions Knisley, Walter Ray Williams, Jr. and Mark Seibold in succession in 1988, he probably would have remarked: "I reckon this kid's a hoss shoe pitcher to be reckoned with in the future." So right! A dream come true for Francis, who had all the top pitchers looking over their shoulders at Spearfish.

In winning the 1989 title, Francis became the fifth pitcher in the history of World Championship competition to win the junior crown and follow in later years with the Championship.

At 19, he became the youngest pitcher to win the "big one" since Williams won his first crown in 1978 at the age of 18. In 1967 Danny Kuchcinski was 17 when he won his first championship, Putt Mossman in 1924 was 18 and Harold Falor, the 15-year old youngster won in 1923.

All of these youthful flingers continued to show their ability except Falor, whose parents decided that schoolwork was more important than pitching shoes. In the case of the 1989 champion, Francis plans to continue pitching, handling schoolwork, work on the farm and all the other activities and interests in his life.

During the interview after the TV finals in Spearfish, Alan said, "hopefully, I'll be back, I might win, I might lose. Don't know." He added: "I was speechless after the win. It was a great thing to happen to me. Jim (Knisley) is a great player, and it was a privilege to pitch against him and come out a winner.

Reminiscing a little, the other four pitchers who have won both the junior and the men's or women's titles have been Seibold from Indiana, Williams from California, Sandy

McLachlin from Canada and Tari Powell, Illinois. All four of them will be in Georgia in quest of yet another title.

Francis missed a chance to be alone in total junior championships but lost on his fifth try at Ainsworth, Nebraska. He is currently tied at four straight with Gary Roberts of Ohio, who won from 1961-1964. Three other former juniors have won three titles: Dave Loucks (1951-1952-1953), Walter Ray Williams Jr. (1971-1972-1975) and Mark Dyson (1979-1980-1981).

Alan graduated from the junior ranks with honors. His ability carried him to 12th in his first men's championship effort, boosted him to fifth in 1988 at Pleasanton, before his top, pressure-packed victory carried him to his first place at Spearfish.

Alan Francis is a winner. You don't have to ask this lanky Northwest State University sophomore how he became that way...Competition. Just look at the impressive record in horseshoe pitching and the results in basketball, his second favorite sport.

He played junior high and varsity basketball, mostly as a guard, receiving most valuable player selection, best free throw percentage award, all-conference and all-district honors. His most memorable high school experience was in his senior year when he helped to lead the North Harrison Shamrocks to a third place finish in the State Tournament. Alan made All-State second team, averaged 16.4 points per game and hit 86% of his free throws. Seems like that same percentage follows him in horseshoe pitching tournaments.

Other sports playing a big part in his life include baseball and softball. Francis played little league and senior league baseball for nine years as a pitcher and doubling as shortstop when not pitching. He was selected for the Harrison County All-Star team several times. In softball he played first and third base.

One may wonder how a youngster can be so active in sports and still have time to help around the farm. The Francis family farms 500 acres, raising corn and soy beans. His mother says that "Alan certainly enjoys helping with the field work, does a very good job, and is very helpful to us." Parents Larry and Joyce Francis must have spent many

hours of "taxi" service to and from games. The Francis family is close-knit with older brother, Tom, and younger brother, Brett, helping to furnish competition for the new champion through the years.

Alan was six years old when he was introduced to horseshoes by his father and grandfather Leonard Francis. He went to his first tournament at age 9. He placed third in 1979 and was determined to be the best in the "Show Me State." He is the best in Missouri, having won 10 consecutive championships, six times as a Junior and four in the men's division. He entered the men's division at age 16, although he could have competed as a junior one more year. In his first encounter with the "big Missouri boys" he won and set a new tournament record of 79.6%.

His best tournament ever came in the Fall Independence, Missouri Open when he tossed 112 ringers in 118 shoes (94.9%). As a junior Alan pitched five perfect games in sanctioned tournaments, one was 32 shoes. "I owe a lot of my success to my brother, Tom, who was a great pitcher as a junior. It took a lot of hard work and practice to beat him at home and did prepare me for the championship seasons to follow."

By now, readers are wondering how this World Class star finds the

time for all his activities...May we add that Alan is an avid hunter, enjoys hunting quail, pheasant, turkey and deer. Alan especially likes bow hunting deer.

During the winter months, like Knisley, Alan rarely pitches horseshoes, feeling the need to rest and be able to renew energy and excitement for the game. Let's not forget, he has schoolwork to occupy time during the winter. More activities include the Future Farmers of America, student council, and a member of the Mt. Pleasant Baptist Church, a small country church near his home in Blythedale.

As we drift through the life of Alan Francis, we must admire the master of the $\frac{3}{4}$ turn, and wish him luck in his manipulation of his Deadeye horseshoes, which have so successfully been a part of his strong right hand since 1981.

This cool, lanky six-footer with the smooth style will have the "old-timers" scheduling more practice time before they head for Stone Mountain this year.

It will not be lonely at the top for Alan Francis. He will have several former World Champions just aching to repeat the World Championship of horseshoes. However, this busy 19-year old Champion will always give a good account of himself.

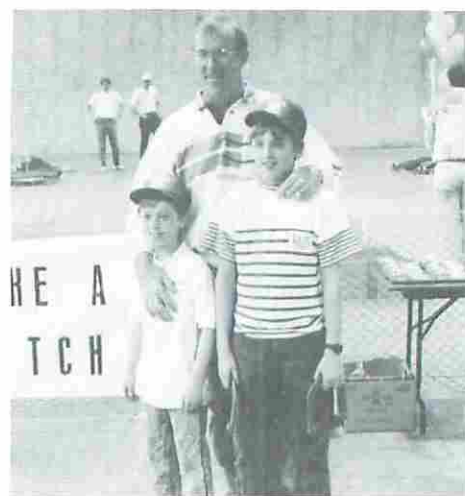
The Jacob Wetterling abduction in October 89, brought not only a state-wide alert, but national attention. The hope and search continues, with much of the effort prompted through Missing Children Minnesota. As in most states, Missing Children Minnesota is funded primarily through private donations. On March 3rd, prominent Minnesota Gopher State Horseshoe Pitchers' Association members paired off with Twin Cities celebrities to benefit Missing Children Minnesota.

The single elimination doubles tournament was successful, with 1989 Junior Boys' State Champion, Vance Harren and former Minnesota Viking "Benchwarmer" Bob Lurtsema winning the championship. The runner-up team consisted of Dave Hughes and Jack Kelly, U.S. Olympic Festival Executive Director. The tournament spotlight was continually on the Harren/Lurtsema team, as Vance shook off the off-season rust, and a

six-hour drive, to pitch 66% ringers over three games.

While the audience applauded in amazement at the skills of the top-ranked pitchers, they were also entertained by the showmanship of Lurtsema and former heavyweight contender, Scott LeDoux. Barry Zevan "The Weatherman" and local emcee personality, served as guest announcer and brought much color to the event. Jack Kelly added to the promotion by announcing all participants and those making donations would receive a 1990 U.S. Olympic Festival T-shirt.

The remainder of the field included: Chris Harren (1988 State Junior Boy's Champion), Dale Lipovsky (three-time Men's World Champion), Len Lipovsky, Ralph Marcks (1989 State Senior Men's Champion), Boni Boser (former Junior Girl's World Champion), Gordy Schmidt, and on the celebrity side: Joe Schmit (KSTP sports announcer), Marge Romero (Missing



Children Minnesota President), and Allan Merrick (former coach of the Minnesota Strikers).

This event was made possible by the Boat Buyers Boat Show, who donated an 80' by 30' space to set up the two-court arena. As in all tournaments, the personnel behind the scenes allow for the success, and a big thank you goes out to: June and George Nick (official scorekeepers), Pat and Dave Senger, Dean Heng (MGSHPA Secretary/Treasurer), Jessica Dunn, Bill Orman (photography), and Len Lipovsky and Ralph Marcks, who helped to construct the pitching arena.

A Profile: Leigh Dunker



There have been 59 South Dakota state horseshoe tournaments, and Leigh Dunker has pitched in nearly every one of them. That is amazing, but more amazing, is the fact that Leigh Dunker has won 33 state championships. His 25th state title came in 1975, which also earned him South Dakota Athlete of the Year honors as voted by the South Dakota Sports Writers Association.

The first championship came in 1934 when Leigh was 19 years old. It was his first state tournament, and a rather spur of the moment notion, for he had not planned to attend until neighbors encouraged him to go to Brookings and they even offered to drive.

Since then, 32 more state championships and a record that may not be matched by any other pitcher. Leigh Dunker has been winning state titles over five decades.

Leigh is now 74 years old and he

and his sister, Elenora, still live on the farm that their parents homesteaded, near Warner. His horseshoe pitching began at the age of eight, when he pitched mule shoes with his father, John. Life and a career on the farm have kept Leigh from participating in world tournaments, due to harvest time coinciding with tournament dates. Yet he has fared well in other tournaments, against proven greats of our sport. Many of his 200 trophies have been earned against the likes of Frank Stinson, Andy Paglarini, Jerry Black, Lee Scharff, Floyd Swarthout, and Art Engebretson, and there is talk about an exhibition victory over Ted Allen.

Age and arthritis have placed limits on his pitching now, but already there are accomplishments that may never be achieved by another pitcher. Leigh Dunker is a living legend in South Dakota.

Wieser's Lake Worth tournament. I won it.

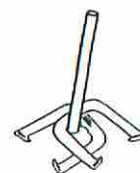

PA State Champ Glen Burris captured 1st place with a blistering 76.8%. Mike DiMartino was second with 74.2%. Kevin Hollister finished 3rd with 76.6%. DiMartino took high percentage game honors, when he fired on 30 out of 34 ringers for a lights-out 88.2%! Horseshoe great, Ruth Hangen, won Women's A-Class with 72.8%.

The Pioneer Club plans to usher in the decade of the '90s with another well-run Open this June. We welcome all past participants to return to the Fairgrounds to help get their pitching game ready for 1990! The club is hopeful that horseshoe legend, Carl Steinfeldt, will also return to further bolster the fine field.

Elden Sarbaugh of Adamsville finished with a 6-1 record and a 77.1 percentage to win the 8th Annual March Open Tournament at Hickory Lake Inn in Newbury.

Former World Champion Walter Ray Williams, Jr. of Stockton, California posted a 5-2 record and 83.5% for second. Williams twice pitched 37 ringers out of 40 shoes for high percent games of 92.5.

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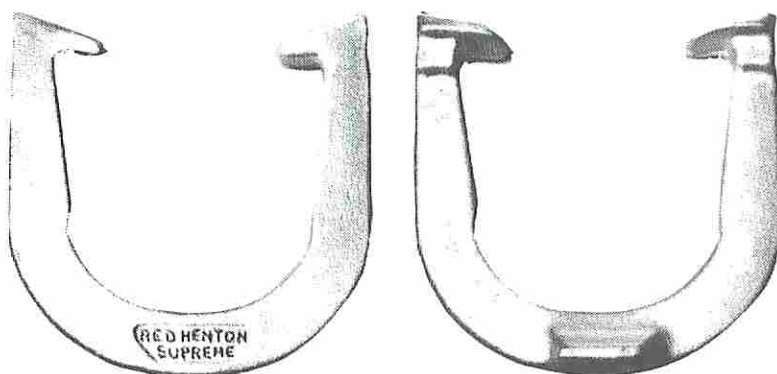
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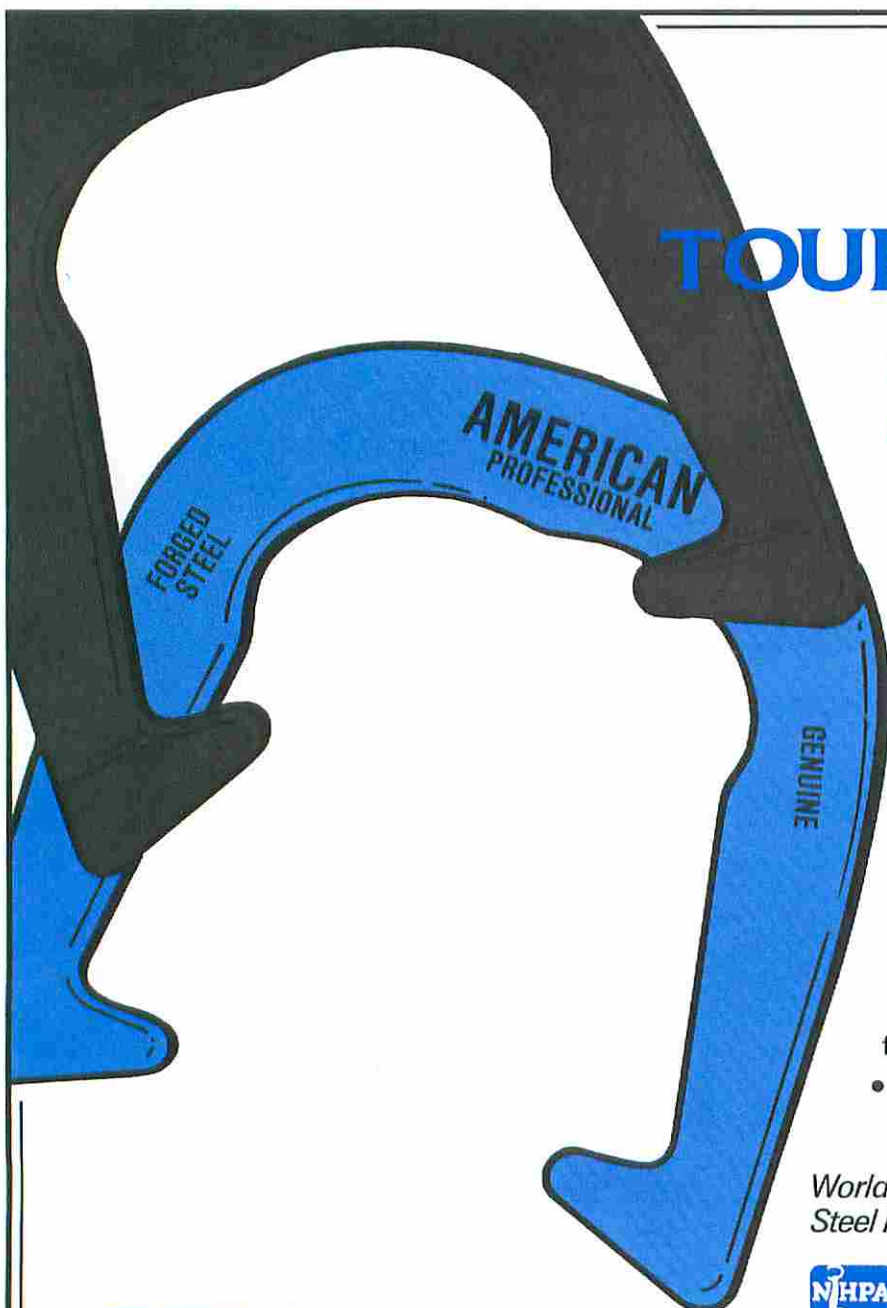
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
