



# President's Message

**N**on-Dues Revenue—money that is raised to support the association without increasing membership dues. Few members like to hear that their dues are going to increase and I'm not hinting at any such step in the near future. But, association expenses have to be supported and during difficult economic times, the use of non-dues revenue producing programs can become an even bigger factor in contributing to the well being of an organization.

What are these non-dues programs? Actually, there are many and they all pretty much relate to useful products and services to the membership. The NHPA, being a rather small association, does not have as many options as larger non-profit organizations but we do have some...namely Game Related Sales, an Affinity credit card, the association magazine *Newsline* and video tape sales.

Ask yourself, "Am I helping the association to keep my dues as low as possible by using 100% of the services and products that the NHPA offers?" 100% means that you purchase all your horseshoes and game related products through the NHPA or one of its authorized distributors; that you subscribe to *Newsline*; that you carry and use the NHPA logo VISA card and that you buy horseshoe instructional or legends video tapes through NHPA sources.

There is no doubt that the sale of horseshoes is the biggest non-dues revenue producer for the NHPA. Your association has negotiated buying agreements with most manufacturers which

brings a small profit to the NHPA for each item sold through authorized association distributors. We do it legally by charging sales tax and reporting to the various state and federal agencies. That can't be said for all the local "trunk salesman"—those that are not authorized by the NHPA and sell out of the trunk of their automobile. Buy from them and the profit goes into their pocket and since not all of them charge you sales tax, they want you to think that you are getting a better deal. Maybe you save a couple of dollars by avoiding the tax, but you do nothing for the association.

Keep in mind that it was the revenue from the NHPA Game Related Sales Program that purchased the portable courts used at World Tournaments, the scoring machines, computers and software used by 4 NHPA Officers, copy machines, Fax machines and all the computer equipment now being used for NatStats. The NHPA also gets 25 cents on every transaction you make with your NHPA Affinity VISA card plus \$3.00 for each card renewal. *Newsline* is the avenue of communication to the membership and it is now showing signs of being totally self sufficient and could become a small profit center for the NHPA with increased subscriptions.

No matter what you're doing, there is always more that can be done. The success of NHPA non-dues revenue producing programs can mean new funding for other association needs, the retention of existing programs, member satisfaction and perpetuation of the association itself. **BUY NHPA.**

## Dave's Court Report

■ Correction: The correct phone number for campground registration at the Syracuse, N.Y. State Fairgrounds is 1-800-321-0386. The ad in the last issue of *Newsline* incorrectly had the last 4 digits as OFUN which translated to a slightly different and incorrect number.

■ Earl Vansant, NHPA RD for Ohio, reports that the 1993 State Championships crowned first time Ohio State Champions in every division. Jim Walters won his first Men's title, Marlene Cooper her first Women's title, Brian Knapp his first Jr. Boys title and Luigia Sanders won the Jr. Girls for the first time. In a state where World Champions and great pitchers are commonplace, this feat gives notice that Ohio intends to stay on top.

■ From Southern California RD Les Burroughs comes this word. The Bakersfield Club in the 5th annual Dennis LaMoureaux Memorial Tournament drew 82 pitchers, hosted a free beef barbecue, gave away many prizes, including 2 T.V. sets, beer steins and \$400 in cash. Not bad for a late year November event. Les also reports that ARD Dave Garbani and members of the Ridgecrest, CA High Desert Horseshoe Club did an outstanding job in a fund raising tournament when they ended up with \$367 for the High Desert Child Abuse Prevention Council.

■ Michigan, the Wolverine State, reports that Lee Jacobs holds a Lifetime NHPA membership card. The State association was established in 1937, but Lee was pitching in the NHPA even before then, as early as 1924. Lee won the MI State Championship 3 times in 1933, 1944 and 1955. He is in both the State and NHPA Hall of Fames. Lee, for 70 years of membership, we salute you.

■ Also from Michigan comes word that Regional Director John Decker has appointed two new assistant RDs. They are Mike

Robinson of Rockford and Steve Summerlin of Clawson.

■ At a Huntington, Indiana tournament a few months ago, former World Champion Mark Seibold pitched a perfect sixteen shoe game. This was the 2nd or 3rd perfect for Mark.

■ 1993 saw a lot of new activity in New York and there will be more as they prepare for the 1994 World Tournament in Syracuse. Just 30 miles from the W.T. site is the town of Conquest, home of the Auburn club. Members, including 2-time Class World Champ Dave Reynolds play on an 18 court facility at Bill & Lottie's Tavern. They held 4 sanctioned tournaments in 1993 with an even better schedule planned this year.

■ Bart Sargent, W.T. Records keeper extraordinaire, has a special offer to all members. Bart has compiled a Record Book on virtually every player who has pitched in a World Tournament, from Frank Jackson in 1910 up to and including every participant in the 1993 Spearfish tournament. All are listed in alphabetical order with each year of play, class, position, wins, losses, ringers, shoes pitched and percentage. This printed loose leaf binder book contains 467 pgs. at \$100. ■ Walter Ray Williams Jr. has been getting a lot of press lately, primarily because of his record setting year on the PBA tour. The Nov. issue of *Bowling* magazine pictured Walter on the cover with a 4 page spread. The Associated Press did a big story in Sept. that was picked up by many newspapers across the country. On Nov. 19th, Walter was the feature story in the "Leisure & Arts" section of the Wall Street Journal. # Letters to the Editor

Dear Editor,

The subject of 30' vs. 40' pitchers has a lot of people upset. Rarely has a tournament separated the two groups. So at present we are living with the problem.

I moved down to 30' 2 years ago, after my coordination deteriorated to the point where I was going to hurt someone. Now instead of getting beat by people in the lower half of the alphabet. I am getting clobbered by the upper half.

The proposed change in scoring because of the "skill level" involved (30' ringers, 3; 40' ringers, 4) is interesting. Does the 35' pitcher get 3½ points?

If it were not for the 30' allowance for people over 70, a lot of us would not be throwing horseshoes today. We need all the pitchers we can get.

Ringer percentage is the skill level at 30 or 40 feet regardless of gender or age. Equal ringer percentages are just that—equal.

I love this sport and support it every way I can; however, some 40' pitchers need to lighten up. Then it would be more enjoyable for all.

To The Editor,

In the last issue, R.M. Thackeray of Jerome, Idaho asked for comments from 30' men horseshoe pitchers. Here is what I think.

I used to also say that I'd never pitch 30' and often was critical of women and other 30' pitchers. But after reaching age 65, I started to throw everything short and this continued through age 69. I finally realized that if the game was going to remain fun for me, I had to move up.

My first attempt at the shorter distance took less than one-half hour to adjust. In my first tournament at 30' I increased my percentage by 27%. My second tournament saw a 34% increase. So, while I am now one of them, I still have to agree that in mixed play, the 30 foot pitcher generally has an advantage. So I would suggest that any 40' pitcher who plays a 30' pitcher with an equal or higher average should be given 4 points for each ringer. But, if the 40' player has the higher average going in, they should both count a ringer as just 3 points. To me, this would

be fair. The 30' pitcher should give more when playing an opponent of equal or less percentage and play head to head at 3 points a ringer if the 40' pitcher is better.

Dear Editor,

I wonder what most participants would say if you ask them what the World Tournament means to them. I suspect some might say the best vacations our family ever had, a chance to share our game with new friends from all over the world, or a reunion with hundreds of old friends I've met during the years I've been attending. These are all things that come to mind when I think of the World Tournaments we've attended.

The highlight of the two week event for many is being a spectator during the 36 man round robin which leads to the crowning of a new world champion. The intensity and significance of these games is magnified by the type of audience that attends. This audience is made up of hundreds of competitive horseshoe pitchers who may never be able to reach the skill level necessary to make the championship class, but certainly can appreciate the skill of those performing.

After the tournament last summer I talked to the Open Men's World Champion about competing in the World Tournament. I asked him if he thought he would be more likely to excel in a tight game if competing with no audience or with hundreds of people anxiously awaiting the outcome. The answer was, the more people watching, the more important it becomes, with better concentration and likely a better performance.

If you ask people why they first decided to attend the World Tournament, most would probably say because it gave them a chance to compete with 36 people of nearly equal skill level from all over the world for the title of World Champion of their class. In 1993 I was lucky enough to be one of those winners. I figure the odds are that if I continue to attend for another 35 years I might be lucky enough to win again.

I don't believe I had any trouble with the reality of being "M" class champion meant there were more

## THE BASICS OF HORSESHOE PITCHING VIDEOTAPE

A new horseshoe pitching video, *The Basics of Horseshoe Pitching*. This video, sponsored by St. Pierre Horseshoes, is intended for the new pitcher, schools, libraries, park recreation directors or the individual who might want to just learn more about the game. This could also include long-time pitchers who have some pitching faults or are new to organized horseshoe pitching.

This video, supported by the NHPA, starts at the beginning, when you get your first pair of horseshoes and stakes and want to know what to do next. It covers the basic backyard court to the regulation complex. It talks about dimensions, stake placement, pit contents and foul line.

There are several examples of shoes shown around the stake area with instructions on how to measure points and ringers and how to call the score, both for count-all and cancellation games. It covers the basics of how to hold a horseshoe for the most popular turns and demonstrates how to pitch, covering such items as stance, aim, swing, step, release and follow through.

Best of all, this video has slow motion frames of three different turns that show the release and follow the horseshoe as it rotates and lands in the pit. Even long time pitchers may find this portion helpful to their game.

than 500 40' pitchers who finished with a higher percentage than mine. Reality, however, did nothing to diminish the euphoria I felt upon winning. It was something like what I might have felt watching my son hit a home run in his first little league game, or scoring a touchdown in a midget football game.

If the original purpose of the NHPA holding a W.T. was to crown a World Champion, then the most meaningful championship would be won with a large and appreciative audience on hand. Looking at the World Tournament from this perspective I think we should try to maintain and improve the great format we now have.

# Five Years of *Newsline*

## COVERS

Five years and 37 regular plus 5 special issues are behind us as *Newsline* starts its sixth year of publication. In the beginning, we experimented as we tried to find an interesting format that would be pleasing, cost efficient, and yet give some look of professionalism.

Our boldest and most expensive tests were with full color photo layouts in two issues. Another three issues were printed in two colors where the entire front cover was blue around a black and white picture with a great deal of blue screening on the interior pages. Twelve issues saw the *Newsline* masthead go to solid blue with some items being highlighted in blue throughout the contents. While some of this looked nice, we were still far from achieving our goal of being cost effective.

At the start of 1991, our third year, we cut back to six issues a year and began printing in one color (black) while using a lighter weight, but slightly glossy paper in all but the World Tournament issue. This helped dramatically to reduce production costs without adversely affecting the quality and look.

Often times the cover photo can tell you a story. When we have a feature article, we try to use a corresponding photo. Some months contributions from the membership are scarce and we don't have a feature article or a good photo. It is then that I have to dig for something, not only for the cover but to fill the contents as well.

Like *Sports Illustrated* magazine, I thought it would be interesting to look back over these past five years and see who, what and how many times they have been featured on the cover of *Newsline*.

Inanimate objects, including buildings and photos of horseshoe courts lead the list with 5 cover appearances. As far as individuals go, we have had 56 different people pictured, 34 males and 22 females. Here is the list and the number of times their face has appeared on a different cover.


#### Sodbusters Banquet and Awards #85-C-84

I was reelected this past fall to another two year term as the Wisconsin Charter President. I believe it will keep me better informed and help me to keep things in perspective as an NHPA officer.





# Hall of Fame Report

I have recently received two additions to the museum part of our NHPA Hall of Fame, which are items that have probably been seen by only a few people still active in our sport today. The first is a bronze horseshoe (1927 model) made by several times World Champion C.C. Davis of Kansas City, Missouri.

It seems that Ed McVey was cleaning out E.E. Hoefle's blacksmith shop, which was established in the Centropolis area of Kansas City in 1918. John Gillispie, of Kansas City, realized that this one horseshoe might be something special and with Mr. McVey's permission, brought it to me. The name C.C. Davis is clearly imprinted on the horseshoe and also Kansas City, MO. This writer has seen only four of these shoes and this is one of the best ones yet. I'm very happy to place this horseshoe in the NHPA Hall of Fame, along with the other treasures.

The other item came my way

because of my introduction of Ted Allen's sister, her son and grandson during our banquet at Spearfish this past year. I told those at the gathering that few people probably knew that a few Ted Allen horseshoes had been manufactured years ago with Denver, Colorado printed on them instead of the familiar Boulder, Colorado that we all recognize. I also stated that if anyone knew where one of these might be, if they would send it to me, I would be glad to add it to the NHPA Hall of Fame collection.

In just a few weeks, a package arrived at my door and in it was one Allen horseshoe inscribed Denver, Colorado. The package had come from Bob Champion, our NHPA Publicity Director, but he had sent no information. I have since learned that this horseshoe was one of a pair given to Bob Champion by a Denver pitcher named Bob Beisemeier. It seems that he had picked up the pair of horseshoes at a flea market some-

where. Bob Champion has put one shoe in the Colorado Hall of Fame and has donated the other to our NHPA Hall of Fame. This is truly a priceless part of our past.

While I'm on the subject of old pitching shoes, I'll list some more that would be a part of our pitching history if anyone has any to donate.

I am pleased to announce that Mr. Walter Ray Williams Jr. has been appointed as the new voting member to the NHPA Hall of Fame Committee to replace Mr. Herfurth. I am sure that Walter Ray will be an excellent addition to this distinguished committee and look forward to working with him.

We finally had a few weeks without rain, most of the field work is done and everyone is getting ready for winter. It was a rough year for pitching or anything else. The Junior program got off to a wet start as it rained during our first Junior tournament in early May. We drove stakes in the ground in the show barn at the Warren County Fairgrounds and pitched anyway. The turn out was low because of the weather.

We had it set up so the entry fee was \$6.00, which went towards their membership card. If they had their card already, they received a subscription to our newsletter. We're going to do it again next year, hope for sunshine.

There were some highlights. Iowa had three Junior's at Spearfish. Joseph Smith and Richie Ball were in the boy's championship class. Joseph came in 9th and Richie 10th. They each pitched around 55%. Jenny Hatch pitched in Class C and went 10-0 to win the top prize.

Despite the weather, we increased our Junior membership by one, a small gain but on the right path. I am sending a report about a Junior program in Winterset. John Pletchette surely deserves recognition for his efforts to our sport.


## 8th Graders Introduced to Horseshoes

The Winterset (Iowa, pop. 4,200) eighth graders, all 140 boys and girls, were recently introduced to the game of horseshoes. On three mornings (Oct. 5, 7, 12) the students enjoyed their physical education class at the horseshoe courts. The 8th graders are divided into three morning P.E. classes beginning at 9:15 every other day. Class size ranged from 44 to 50 students, 45-minutes is allowed for each class and includes bus time to/from school.

John Pletchette, Director, City of Winterset Parks and Recreation Department (WPRD) coordinated the horseshoe program for the third year. Fifty (50) horseshoes are gathered and all twelve horseshoe courts at the fairgrounds are used.

The students are introduced to such things as scoring, three different grips, pitching fundamentals and the names of the 1993 World Horseshoe Tourney Women's Champion and Men's Runner-up (Iowan's Cathy Carter and Kevin Cone). The program involves basic instructions, demonstrations, a hand-out and lots of time to pitch. Students are tested on this material just like all other P.E. activities. Following 15-minutes of instructions and demonstrations on the first day, students are divided into two-person teams and play the doubles game using count-all scoring. For safety the following procedures are used when students are pitching. All students on one end begin pitching after a whistle is sounded. Students on the other end stand behind a line, 6 ft. at the back of the pits. When *all* students on one end have completed pitching a whistle is again sounded. Teammates, on the other end, now pick up their shoes and may begin pitching after the next whistle is sounded.

IHHPA Youth Director, Steve Hatch and Russ Bricker assisted Pletchette with instructions and demonstrations. He provided a book about the game of Horseshoes to the school library for youth to checkout. In addition, Steve provided two t-shirts that were given to the boy and girl with



the most ringers throughout the three days of pitching. Pletchette said he did not know what to expect the first year he implemented this program in 1991. He added, "the enthusiasm continues to be great and the students really enjoy getting out to the horseshoe courts. What they most get excited about are RINGERS. Pletchette said, two reasons why he wanted to introduce horseshoe pitching to the schools is 1) new P.E. activity that is a lifetime sport and 2) to take advantage of the 12 horseshoe courts at the fairgrounds. He hopes that several of the students will some day enjoy pitching horseshoes regularly.

Winterset hosts two IHHPA sanctioned tournaments each year. Did the students learn anything? Middle School P.E. Instructors Cathy Hollingsworth and Gary Christensen recorded ringers. Total number of ringers for each day were: 14-38-50.

## Jennie Hatch Iowa Junior Girls' State Champion

Jennie Hatch is a two-time Iowa state champion. She started pitching in 1991, being introduced to the sport by her father, Steve Hatch, current JPD for Iowa. Jennie is a student at Knoxville High School and pitches in the Ken Rosco League (Indinola). Beside winning a World Class Championship in Spearfish, she won a silver metal at the Iowa Games. She credits Mic Wilson for a lot of help and motivation. Her goal—to keep pitching and get her ringer average as high as possible, and to help promote horseshoe pitching as a sport.

Judge Brosky conducted his youth

program for the Boys and Girls Club again in 1993. He hopes to have some of the youngsters ready for tournament competition in 1994. He has done an excellent job. The following is a report of his program.

## "Learn How To Pitch Horseshoes!"

In its third year at the Dormont Horseshoe Club of Pennsylvania, the "Learn How To Pitch Horseshoes" clinic has grown beyond expectations. By adding horseshoe pitching to the summer activities of the Boys and Girls Clubs of Western Pennsylvania, 48 boys and girls age 5 to 16 enrolled in the first session after school let out for the summer.

The coordinator of the program is Judge John G. Brosky, Superior Court of Pennsylvania and past chairman of the Boys and Girls Clubs of Western Pennsylvania Board of Directors. In addition to Judge Brosky, the instructors from the Dormont Horseshoe Club were Joe Pagnanelli, John Kraves, Harry Clements, Robert Horton, Diack James, Gene Swogger, George Bercini and Ron Weiss, State President.

The "Learn How To Pitch" for youth program began after school let out and concluded with a pitching tournament on July 28th. To accommodate the youth, sessions were held every Monday and Wednesday from 10:00 a.m. to noon at the Dormont Club courts. After being given the basic rules of safety on the courts, the teaching of how to pitch was structured to pitch at various distances according to age and ability. The emphasis was on holding the shoe and pitching with accuracy. A tournament at the close of the clinic was not the traditional horseshoe game but a competition of getting ringers and close points in twenty shoes. It is hoped that next year regular horseshoe pitching games will be added to the program.

Hal Mineer, Regional Director, reports they had the best coverage for their State Tournament in many years. Radio on Friday the 17th, NBC Channel 4 of Albuquerque on Saturday and CBS Channel 13 on Sunday plus the *Albuquerque Journal* placed the final results in their sports section.

Ken Jones won his 2nd title in the Men's Class A closing with a 52.4%. Luz Serna, Las Cruces, nailed her 2nd title in the Women's Class A.

Seniors Paul Martin, Churchrock (63.3%) and Ernestine Baca, Las Vegas (14.5) won the two Senior groups, while Carl Zamora from Socorro topped the Junior Boys with a whopping 68.2%.

New Mexico has a unique selection of their secretary-treasurer. This office will be filled by the new officers. In some cases this sounds like a great idea. The 1994 officers are Charles Knotts, Logan, President; Ken Jones, 1st VP and David Romero, Corrales, 2nd VP.

### NORTH CAROLINA

The points for the Player of the Year award look like it's going down to the wire. Clyde Southern has been leading for most of the year and is warned not to look back as there are a couple pitchers gaining on him. The top five are as follows: Southern 173, Tom Eaton 165, Jerry Brittain 145,

Lestes Maness 145, and Troy Brittain 141. The point system is as follows: 1st 7 points, 2nd 4 points, 3rd 1 point, plus each player gets 9 points for entering the tournament.

B.J. Thomas defended his State title in the Men's Division. He has won 7 times in last 8 years. Ruth Letvinchick defended her women's title successfully, Jeremy Gregson won his third Junior Boys title, and Aerial Bolick is the first Girls Champion we have had in many years.

Frank Oldenburg is the first Seniors Champion the NCHPA has ever had.

### OHIO

Troy native Jim Walters, five-time Junior World Champion stepped into the "fast lane" and had no trouble answering his peers. At the 1993 State Tournament at Greenville City Park he presented his answer. Pitching against the likes of former World Champion Jim Knisley from Bremen and Adamsville's Eldon Sarbaugh, Walters came away with the Ohio Championship.

"My ringer percentage isn't as high as in the junior competition, but that is something I will work on, Walters relates. (Champ notes that practice will be the order of the day until the World.)

Walters finished with a 9-2 record and 72.8. Remember that Alan Francis won the 1993 World Title with 77.0%.

1992 Women's World Champion Sue Snyder won the Final Four Ladder playoff to capture the Ohio State Fair Governor's Open. 160 pitchers competed for the third highest purse—\$10,000. Jim Knisley was second, followed by Mark Seibold and Henry Hostetler.

This was a 40-shoe count-all event sponsored by the Ohio State Fair and the Whetstone Horseshoe Club.

### OREGON

Tuff Moles from Grants Pass and John Mikota from Medford closed with a 6-2 record and 49.05% to win the Class A division in the State Doubles at Roseburg. The winners survived a playoff against Donna Graham and Lee Wallace.

Bill Graham from Bend and Dick Griffith, Gilchrist copped the Class B crown and Harold Sapp, Eugene and Dutch Craiger won the Class C Division.

The 1993-94 Totem pole has been initiated by the State Officers. It lists the individual highest game pitched.

As of the latest newsletter the leaders are as follows: Lowell Davis 91.6, Patty Sapp 82.1, Joe Ann Loy 80.0, David Gorton 75.0, Jerry Gorton 73.2, Bill Graham 63.7, Phil Tyler 56.0, Warner Kirlin 55.5, Gus Doum 55.2, Harold Sapp 55.0, Ruth Heckman 53.8, Dutch Craiger 50.0, George Hughes 50.0, and Jim Robertson 47.2 to round out the top 15.

The latest club in the state is the Gresham Horseshoe club...now with over 30 members. Rudi Braun was the "Heart of it all."

### PENNSYLVANIA

Glenn Burris of Bellefonte won his sixth consecutive State Class A title on the Beaver Horseshoe Courts over the Labor Day weekend. 181 pitchers competed in the fifth highest figure in the history of the event. This is his 7th win and with one more he will tie Al Zadroga Sr.'s record of 8 Pennsylvania titles.

Several new champions were crowned: Our first 30-foot Elders Champ was Judge John Brosky from Carnegie. John Meikle, Jr. won the Elders 40-foot crown. In the

Seniors the winner was Ron Myers, Sr. of Franklin.

Aileen Drayer of Erie copped the women's crown and Paul Butcher from Erie won the junior title.

After fifty years of no competition, 86 year old Mervin George from Jackson Center is back. At times he is pitching 50% or better and is the State's Class B Champion for 1993. Mervin pitched in the state championship in 1927 and 1929 and won the title both years.

### TENNESSEE

Dexter Stallings pitched in the Senior Olympic Games held in Clarksville during the last week of July. He won all ten games and received a gold medal and plaque. He was known as the man with the wooden box and the pick-up stick. Dexter didn't let the 100-degree weather affect his pitching. His wife, Lois, and grandson kept him well supplied with water to prevent dehydration.

Willis Grant, Tony Norwood, Walt Pierce (deceased) and Randall Pruitt (deceased) were inducted into the THPA Hall of Fame September 25 during the T.R. Little tournament.

Lois Webster, Don Titcomb and Lundee Blevins from Central Kentucky won the Team Invitational Tournament November 6 and 7 at the Jack Freeman Courts in Joelton.

High percentage for the tournament went to Webster (77.2). Ron Powell of Western Kentucky had the high game of 92%. Prize money totaled \$1200.00. The winning team received \$375.

Terry Teela of Springville (9-0, 56.9) was the 1993 Men's champion and Shirley Steffen from Monticello (9-0, 58.5) was the Women's winner in the annual event.

A. Lee Jones (10-1, 60.6) from St. George copped the Men's Senor crown and Casey Larsen, Grove, (9-0, 24.4) nailed the Boys' title with Klerisa Newby, Venice, taking the Girls' Championship.

Sherlyn and Del Feltenbarger from Taylorville reigned as the doubles champions with Dennis Ohms, Cedar City and Robert Tibbs, Indianola finishing on top of Class B.

The top money winner to date is John Bracken \$258.50. Cleo Wardle has the most wins 65, Bracken has the high ringer percentage 71.4 (30 ft.), Gary Wood 52.7% in the 40 foot class. The most improved is Keith Thomas with 15.4% higher. Stacey Glendon's 28.1 tops the juniors. He also has the most wins 29, and most improved 8.6%.


### WISCONSIN

## Horseshoe Tournament and Electronic Message Display Board for the Orange Horseshoe Club

In our mind's eye, we see a *Rockwell* sketch. A man of many years, well-tanned and weather-faced beneath a straw hat, wearing well-worn denim overalls, is standing amongst his friends, also of many years, who's faces are also tanned and weathered. Gathered between house and barn, these gents have come together for a relaxing game of tossing their work-horses' old shoes across a specified space and trying to attain the victory of making the horseshoe wrap itself around a crude railroad peg they have hammered halfway into the ground.

While some of us today rarely give this game a second thought, this way of passing time for tired farmers has become a popular sport enjoyed by peoples of all ages, genders and races in our world today. Gone are the crude railroad spikes and the discarded shoes a farmer's horse once wore. In their place are manicured pits filled with moist clay and horseshoes that cost as much as \$100.00 a pair.

A constant problem, however, in many tournaments today has been keeping the players organized with where they should be and who their opponents might be. Now, after many years, The Orange Horseshoe Club of Orange, California, has developed new equipment to improve and enhance the quality and structure of their tournament operation.

A new tournament scheduling board has been constructed to make clearly visible the activities of an ongoing tournament, with an electronic message display sign being incorporated into the scheduling board. This display unit not only increases immensely the ability to project information, but the uses of

the message board are almost limitless. Both pre-programmed and separate messages can be displayed during tournament time.

A 20-year dream of co-founder and still active member Eston Brown, being realized, the construction of the tournament board was completed in the latter months of 1993.

The idea of an electronic message display board had many appealing aspects, but the promotion of the sport and enhancement of the game were the primary two. Of its many capabilities, which include graphics, animation, current temperature, a clock, date, memory files, computer hook-up wire/wireless remote keyboard and unlimited possibilities for all sorts of messages, the board also announces pre-registration deadlines, important information for players, players' names, opponent players' names and individual players' handicaps.

One of the new tournament board's advantages is that after the tournament, a picture can be taken for a permanent record of the event.

We have noticed a sharp decline in confusion by contestants about where they should be at any point. Additionally, it also reduces traffic at the Director's table by players trying

to find out how they, or their opponents, are doing. It eliminates those familiar, small, hard to see by more than one or two people at a time clipboards hanging on a fence that have served their purpose for many years, but are now outdated. The biggest difference we have noticed is in how smoothly an event is now run due to reduced confusion by everyone involved. Information is easier to see and understand.

An electronic message display board was planned from the beginning and several were tested before one was found that was bright enough to be seen outdoors in bright sunlight. We use the message board to announce future tournaments and events, to thank sponsors, to greet visitors, and to comment generally on games in progress, etc.

Further advancing this sport, The Orange Horseshoe Club has recently developed a new type of sound and public addressing system. Using components donated by Unitrol Corporation (who make emergency sound and lighting systems and equipment for police and fire vehicles), the Club utilized an amplifier, normally used in an emergency vehicle, with a 58 watt speaker and complete with a microphone to make



a portable addressing and sound system. The power supply is a 12-volt battery.


Using this equipment, the Club can play the National Anthem from a tape cassette before each tournament. With the Star Spangled Banner playing and both the United States and California State flags waving proudly, the stage is set for a professional sport to commence its games.

The Orange Horseshoe Club was founded in 1972 by Eston Brown and Jerry Schneider. The club membership is about 60. We have some of the best courts in California, and our clay is outstanding!

We have a five-time World Senior champion in our club, Willard "Spud" Napier. We also have a 5-time State champion, Jerry Schneider. The club has three permanently mounted signs at our courts. On these signs are World and State champions from our club. Also, we have all SCHPA Hall of Fame members from our club. These signs give our members recognition and motivation, and a lot of spectators are interested in them as well.

Last, but certainly not least, our club is graced with the welcomed membership and always willing participation of Wally Shipley, a 19 year member who enjoys the fruits of his many accomplishments through the years, which include in part: 7-year president of SCHPA, Hall of Fame for the SHHPA, 10-year president of the NHPA, Hall of Fame for the NHPA, recipient of the Stokes Memorial Awards for the NHPA, and 10-year games-related distributor for the NHPA.

The Orange Horseshoe Club grate-



fully acknowledges the sponsorship and assistance of (in no particular order) The Gordon Horseshoe Company; the Anaheim Firefighters Assn.; Bill Carroll; The Shoe Crew of Bakersfield, CA; C-J Signs; The City of Orange; The SCHPA; Ed Nunn (Unitrol Corporation); Big M Auto Parts; Ganahl Lumber; Barnes Upholstery (for the covers that protect the tournament board when stored); Pro-Lite, Costa Mesa (for the electronic message display board); Bill Neal; Eston Brown; and Joe Roman for their time and work, and all of the members of The Orange Horseshoe Club for their donations, patience and loyal support while the project was being completed.

The electronic message display board and new sound and public address system included, The Orange Horseshoe Club's new tournament board will be used at the California State Championships in Bakersfield in 1994. Too bad *Rockwell* can't be there to sketch it.




*This picture shows the pyramid covers used by Russell to protect his court from the weather.*

# Music City Invitational Team Tournament

The Jack Freeman Indoor Court in Joelton, Tennessee was the scene of the 1993 Music City Invitational Team Tournament for the third consecutive year November 6 and 7. Six teams received an invitation to participate. They were: Alabama, Central Kentucky, Tennessee, Indiana, Ohio, and Western Kentucky. Jack Freeman and Mary Bastian served as tournament directors with a great deal of help from other members of the Music City Club.

All games were 50 shoe cancellation. There were three players on each team for a total of 18 players participating in the event. Each player pitched one game against the 15 players from the opposing five teams for a total of 15 games over the two days. The team who won the most games would be the champion. The total ringer percentage average for the three players on a team could only total 210% with the exception that one player could be a 75%+ pitcher and still add only 70% to the team total of 210%.

Central Kentucky came out on top with 30 1/2 wins and 14 1/2 losses. Lois Webster led that team with a 77.2 average. Ron Powell on the Western Kentucky team had the high game of 92%. Western Kentucky was 2nd followed by Ohio in 3rd. The total cash purse was \$1200. The winners got to take home the big traveling trophy, which will be brought back for next year's event. Indiana and Kentucky were winners the previous two years. In 1994, the Music City event will likely have a Class B section with a lower total per-







# The Toll of Time



**CLARENCE BELLMAN**

Indiana lost one of its finest horseshoe pitchers. Clarence Bellman died October 10, 1993 at the age of 72 following a 6 month bout with cancer. Clarence lived in Breman, IN, and is survived by his wife Evelyn and five children: Caren Jean, Diann,

Bonnie Lou, Schona Kay and Stuart Allen. He worked as a feed delivery man; in retirement, he served as a driver for his Amish neighbors.

Known as a real gentleman on and off the courts, Clarence played in NHPA tournaments for 34 years. He held the title of Indiana State Men's Champion in 1975, 1976, 1981 and 1983. He was inducted into the Indiana Hall of Fame in 1977.

In 1975 Clarence placed 5th at the World averaging 78.5%. He placed 10th in 1977, averaging 80.7% and 13th in 1978 averaging 72.2%. At the 1992 World, Clarence won the Men's Class A Championship averaging his age, 71%.

An avid horseshoe pitcher, serious illness did not keep him off the courts. He returned to league pitching during the summer of 1993 and played in an IHPA tournament in August. The town of Breman recognized him this summer by nam-

ing and dedicating its new courts in his honor.

## LEIGH JOHN HENRY DUNKER

South Dakota lost one of its best known horseshoe pitchers with the death of Leigh Dunker on November 20, 1993 at the family farm, south of Warner where he was born on 3/23/15. Between the years 1934-1987, Leigh won the State Championship 33 times. In 1975 after winning his 25th State Title, the South Dakota Sports Writers Association voted Leigh South Dakota Athlete of the Year. He was also featured in *Sports Illustrated* magazine and received the SI Award of Merit.

In 1991, Leigh was inducted into the South Dakota Hall of Fame. He was a past secretary of the State HPA, played several years on a state amateur baseball team and was a very good bowler. Leigh Dunker was a living legend in South Dakota and he will be missed by all those who knew and admired him.

## JOHN P. FUDURIC

The Ohio association reports the October 23, 1993 death of member John Fuduric, who died in bed of an apparent heart attack at age 78. John was a member of the Burton Horseshoe Club and a lifelong resident of Cleveland. Always one that could be counted on to assist at any of the tournaments, John was an active member in regular and traveling league play around Northeast Ohio. Grandpa John, as he was affectionately called, was most proud of his grandson Tony who 1993 was drafted out of high school by the Detroit Tigers and finished the season pitching for Bristol in Class A baseball.
