

President's Message

onnie Roberts, NHPA Secretary-Treasurer has resigned. Poor health in recent months has prevented Donnie from giving the time necessary to keep up with the job and for the good of the organization, he felt it best to step down.

Replacing someone with 20 years experience in the position is not always an easy thing to do. Fortunately, NHPA 5th Vice President, Dick Hansen has stepped forth and will assume the Secretary-Treasurer responsibilities. Dick has been on the NHPA Executive Council for two years and for many years has been the Wisconsin State Charter President. He has now given up the State Office position to have more time to devote to the NHPA.

Dick Hansen will do a good job for the NHPA in the Secretary-Treasurer position. He is experienced in both charter and national needs and well respected throughout the organization. While Dick is taking over the last year of the two year secretary-treasurer's term, he has announced his intention to run for the office at this year's election. For the next six months, Dick will be able to give only evening and weekend hours to the Secretary job. His wife Paulette will assist him. If elected, Dick will retire from his day job and devote all his efforts to the NHPA. The Executive Council unanimously supports Dick Hansen in his bid for the Secretary-Treasurer position and asks the charter delegates to vote for him in Gillette. I realize this request is outside the norm because the Council usually does not vocally support any candidate over another. However, in this instance, Dick is stepping in at a time of need and many important functions must be transferred to him—bank accounts, taxation reporting, membership and such. The Council believes we have to maintain continuity in this position for at least one elected term to be cost effective. We therefore urge you to support Dick in the election bid. If he wins the Secretary-Treasurer position, he will step down from his 5th VP job and I will name a replacement after the election.

1996 membership cards were late in being ordered. They are now available from your charter secretary. Many *Newsline* subscriptions and renewals were also delayed in processing. Our current subscriber mailing list may not be up-to-date. It will take some time before we can get on top of everything needed due to this change. Please be patient if you have been affected.

As Newsline editor and publisher, I intend to take over the mailing and subscriber lists which in the past had been generated by the Secretary-Treasurer. This means that new subscriptions and renewals should be sent to me for processing. This will somewhat ease the administrative work of the Secretary-Treasurer. However, this transition will take a few months, as the mailing list has to be updated and put on different software than the Secretary has been using.

There will probably be some other changes in our administrative procedures, but these will come over time and probably be noticed only by the charter secretaries. With your cooperation and perhaps some extra effort, this change in office can take place without any significant problems.

To Donnie Roberts, I wish only the best and a speedy return to good health. I'm sure all the membership joins me in thanking you for the 20 years of dedicated service to the organization.

Dave's Court Report



Letters to the Editor

Dear Editor,

Since the NHPA voted in the 30' rule, I positively cannot remember an issue of *Newsline* that has not had some argument on this subject. What is so puzzling to me is why it was voted to allow guys to move a full 10' when they could no longer pitch 40'.

In the World Tournament, this doesn't matter, as they have their own group. At small local tourneys and leagues however, I find it very frustrating to pitch against someone 8-10 years younger who is pitching a full 10 feet closer. This could be avoided if the 30' distance were cut back to 35'. I would like to see the delegates vote on this.

I'm also against the 50 shoe deal being considered for the World and being put into effect by some charters. When you are 70 or 80 years old, a round robin of 50 shoe games in mixed play becomes and endurance contest against guys and gals 20-50 years younger. If it is hot or humid, I ask you, "who is going to fade the quickest?" Let's keep 40 shoe games and vote to stop allowing men to move up a full 10' just because they reach seventy years of age. Physical handicapped O.K. but for a healthy elder man who has been pitching 40', a move to 35' would be more than enough. Don Dean, Apache Junction, AZ

Dear Editor,

Horseshoes could be escalating if we, the members, would put forth some effort ourselves. Unfortunately, most pitchers are takers, not givers. How many give the time to get and keep their club courts in good pitching condition? How many water, turn, and cover the courts if they are the last pitcher to use them? If only the last 15 minutes would be used to care for the courts, they would be back in shape for the next day of pitching. This is giving back to what the courts gave us.

The condition of your club courts speak well of the amount of care they get. Good courts draw more horseshoe pitchers to tournaments than poor courts. I would like to suggest that clubs who hold sanctioned tournaments charge an extra dollar per entrant. Put this money aside and at

the annual State meeting, take a vote of what club maintained the best courts for their sanctioned tournaments. The winning club would then get all this extra money to hold a banquet or whatever as a reward for their members who obviously worked harder than the members of other clubs on court maintenance.

This program would help motivate other clubs to improve their courts, which in turn would bring more tournament entries and escalate the game of horseshoe pitching. Perhaps the following words about the game as I see it will help some others.

Dear Editor.

I had a dream. In that dream the game of horseshoes somehow became human and took on a human voice. That voice was heard to say,—How unfair I have been all these years by not allowing everyone who plays my game an equal opportunity to pitch to a peg that has no shoes on or around it. No matter how long or short a game may last or who was playing who, everyone should have been given a chance to go first 50% of every game. Even though a player was behind 28-6 in a 35 point game

and a "six" had just been thrown against him, it was his turn to go first and "hope springs eternal." But then—"Bang!"—whatever it was woke me up and reality set in with the words. I got the point, I go first!

Oh well, at any rate, for awhile it was a pleasant dream. But still the question lingers on. Why should the better pitcher on that particular day pitch first more than 50% of any horseshoe game?

I am, of course, talking about Alternate Pitch. So if you find yourself pitching against a really "hot" pitcher and you get to pitch first no times or at best, a few times, you have no one to blame but yourself.

As Casey Stengel has said, "you can look it up." And what do you look up?—the Official Rules of Horseshoe Pitching. Rule 9, Section A, Article 2, Alternate Pitch.

FOCUS ON **PROMOTION**

Growth—The Result of Promotion

Membership growth is important to our sport-to our organization. Growth is the result of appropriate promotion. Over the last 2-3 years, we have not experienced significant growth, membership being fairly constant. This plainly says that promoting efforts put forth have resulted in merely maintaining membership levels. We have managed to replace departing members, but not resulting

Why is growth important to the NHPA? Growth proves that our organization is not stagnant. Growth is the indicator we are doing what the NHPA is about—to promote the sport

of horseshoe pitching.

When there is no growth, signals are set off-there should be concerns: Are we not promoting our organization? Is our promotion not widespread enough? Are we trying to sell something that lacks over-all

public appeal?

Growth in membership has little to do with generating more revenues. It has to do with bringing in people to the finest level of organized horseshoe pitching that is available. There are over 20,000,000 Americans that pick up a horseshoe sometime during a given year. If just 1% of those these individuals belonged to the NHPA, we would enjoy a membership of

over 200,000. With all those people in our county who have some casual interest in our sport, why wouldn't we want them to belong to our fine organization, and expand our leagues, start new leagues, and build our future?

Is thinking of membership of 200,000 when our present enrollment is 15,000 realistic? There are 20,000,000 people in the United States that at least occasionally pitch horseshoes. Surely a goal of 1% or 2% of those people is a reasonable objective. All of us should accept the responsibility to invite them.

Our process of promotion needs some upgrading, our tools of promotion need revision, our interest in promotion needs rejuvenation. The image portrayed by the NHPA must also be a priority. The general public views our sport as little more than a picnic activity. For the most part, the general public is not even aware that the NHPA exists, let alone associate it as the governing organization of the sport, or that we maintain the finest of all sanction league programs. We really have a job to do here. With some success in making the public aware of our organization, we stand a stronger chance to find results from our promotion investment.

What can we do? Advertise. We


need to get the name National Horseshoe Pitchers Association out before the public's eyes. Charters and clubs should run an ad. As part of this article, a print-ready draft is provided for every member, every league, every charter to simply photocopy, type in contact names and phone numbers and take to the local newspaper office. Most local papers will run this ad at no fee to clubs, simply as a public service announcement. Some major papers may require a fee, but this is where the charter officers can come forward with state association funds to cover the cost. Just think, if this ad ran two times across the entire country and in local and major papers, there would be a response in new members.

What else can we do? Improve our image and change public perspective of our sport. There have been very few charity events or efforts by our sport to benefit others rather than our membership. A couple of benefit events were mentioned in our last Newsline, but we need more tournaments across the country being conducted to provide charity funds to local worthwhile agencies. The media will be more likely to give our sport coverage and publish photos and a statement of a club representative presenting a check to a local worthy cause. This type of media coverage will do us a world of good and imagine now the opportunity for following events to draw in sponsorship to support charitable efforts. This, in time, will change the public perspective of our sport.

Charter officers can take a leadership role in this area and take steps to designate one or two major tournaments as charitable events. Once or twice each season, pitchers will participate without the expectation of awards. In time, this effort will do more than anything else we can do,

to uplift our public image.

These very basic steps are what our organization needs. Hopefully our membership will accept the challenge to do a few things differently. We are not going to achieve growth by continuing to do things the very same. Seventy-five years of history shows that to be true.



PROMOTION JOTTINGS

Sometimes looking into the future is not so easy or appealing, but to take a look back into our history is always enjoyable. Here are a couple of portraits of early-day promoters and a most interesting view of the sport in California as written by Art Headlough in 1920.

Horseshoe Pitching in California

"Horseshoe pitching is one of the favorite sports in the Golden State. For a number of years the game was played under no standard rules. The southern part of the state is the hotbed for the game and is given to horseshoe pitching more than any other part of the Pacific Coast.

In 1900, the Long Beach Tourist Club was organized, Mr. W.S. Montgomery, an attorney, its first president being the moving spirit. Its 600 membership extended to 25 states and Canada. No special matches or tournaments have ever been held on the Pacific Coast, but the interest in the game has been kept alive by some fifteen or more clubs including Pasadena, Pomona, San Bernardino, Redlands, Santa Barbara, Long Beach, Glendale, Whittier, Mouroria, South Park, Los Angeles and Fullerton. Many excellent scores have

been made and several good horseshoe pitchers developed.

The game has never been played by the national standard rules, but the

distance of 40 feet is played; 4-pound shoes are used and to score, a pitched shoe has to be within 6 inches of the stake, which is more than a foot above the level of the ground; all scoring rules are the same as the national. (In 1920, most states were playing with an 8 inch stake and had 12 inch guideline for close shoes). Many of the players have their own ideas of the game and did not seem to favor the national method of horseshoe pitching until, through the efforts of Mr. George E. Krimbill, secretary of the Long Beach Tourist Club, a state association known as the Golden State Associa-

tion of Horseshoe Pitchers of California was organized June 12, 1920, and perfected the following 26th day of June, electing the following officers:

W.A. Hoyt, president, Long Beach; George E. Krimbill, secretary, Long Beach; H.L. Smith, assistant secretary, Pasadena; T. Holman, treasurer, Glendale. All the officers are good live horseshoe boosters and it is intended to hold the first state tournament ever held in California. The Golden State association promises to be one of the most active in the United States. They are looking forward to the time when they can hold a national tournament in their state."

I get phone calls asking where to find sanctioned courts. I can now give an answer.

To all the outgoing Regional Directors, I thank them all for their service to the NHPA and to the new Regional Directors. Your willingness to accept your positions and your enthusiasm will help the NHPA grow.



Austin stated they were already talking about doing this again next year.

Nebraska RD, Pat Wemhoff, reports on the Jack McKinney Invitational Tournament this past Sept. The Championship included the following greats: Jesse Gonzales, CA; Richard Pintor, CO; Spud Napier, CA; Paul LaCrosse, CO; Elwyn Cooper, MO; and Dave Hughes, MN. The first day was a singles sanctioned tournament with four 8-man classes. The second day the low man tagged up with the man with the highest ringer percent and on down the line for a fun tournament. Jack also supplied food and refreshments for all. It was a real fun time for all.

New England States RD, George St. Pierre, reports that since Labor Day he has been involved with setting up a 5-day horseshoe charity event involving the public at Brad Park's Sports Plex. George is also organizing a demonstration event with John Kapnis and Debby Michaud with the City of Peabody, MA. The people he is coordinating with want to build some new horseshoe courts in the area. George reports that things are looking up for our sport in the northeast.



One of my new Regional Directors, Ron Deckard, Florida sent me this post card of his home courts in Clearwater. The back of the card gives information on the courts. (18 covered courts, bleacher seating for 250, home of the Florida Hall of Fame, leagues Tues.-Thurs.). It is said to be the finest outdoor pitching complex facility in the east. The postcard is a good idea and advertising for their club and something other clubs may want to pick up on. The Clearwater Club has something they can be proud of.

Gail Sluys, RD for Northern California, reports that once the rain finally stopped, Northern California held 136 successful tournaments during the 1995 pitching season. They hosted the State championship Labor Day Weekend at the Yolo Club in Davis where Teddy Guillotte beat out the ladies and Walter Ray Williams, Jr. regained the men's championship.

It was an exciting year with 5,408 tournament entrants for an average of 40 per tournament. Almost all of the tournaments were made up of mixed groups (short and full distance pitchers) providing better group equality percentage-wise and left only a few tournaments to be handicapped.

The N. California 1996 schedule is 155 tournaments. They start pitching in February, if the weather allows. It works as a crosscheck so that each and every sanctioned tournament has a positive report.

The response from the Regional Directors has been overwhelming. They have found and reported many tournaments in a short time, and I thank them for their cooperation in this matter. With all the work I have been giving them lately it is more than likely why I received so few RD reports this time around.

Music City Team Tournament

Alan Francis and Amy Brown needed Fred Brown's lower percentage for legal entry. Combining two super-pitchers proved to be the winning edge for the Music City title. While Fred won just one game, Francis won all 17 and Amy lost only two.

Jack Freeman played the complete host at the Music City Team Tournament this year. His pitching arm is mending from two operations and although his range of motion is better, he is still unable to pitch.

Undaunted, Freeman invited others to fill the indoor courts for two days of team action early November—two sections of "A" class'; one "B" class, one "C" class—24 teams.

This Music City format calls for each player on a three-pitcher team to play one game with each team member within the class. Classes were six teams. Extended it comes to 15 games—ten games Saturday, five

Sunday and Sunday afternoon the top five teams from the two A sections began a stepladder play-off.

Some teams had homes—Tennessee, Connecticut, Alabama, Georgia, Ohio, Wisconsin, Ontario, Kentucky—others were mixed. The percentage cap (215) being prevalent. The mixed sixth place team, for example, was: Mark Seibold of Indiana, Don Titcomb of Kentucky, and Dave Loucks from California.

On the play-off ladder, in fifth place, were the Tennessee twins, Max Griffith and Mar Ray with their apparel designer, Paula Hunsicker. The flashy team with high average won the best dressed award but lost their first match to World Champion, Sue Snyder. Ron Meredith (both Kentucky) and Ralph Guffey (Indiana).

Second game. Snyder and company won again, trading positions with the team of Ron Powell, Charlie

Meredith (both Kentucky) and Al Morris (Indiana).

In the third ladder game Snyder went head to head with another World Champ—Alan Francis of Missouri. Francis won. His partner, Amy Brown of Ohio won. They carried Fred Brown, also Ohio, into the final match against the tournament leaders.

The team with a name (Tuff-E-Nuff) of, Art Tyson, New York; Phil Fleshman, and Pete Shomete, both Maryland, could not hold up against the combination of Francis and Amy Brown. This last time they gave Fred a ride all the way to an engraved spot on the Music City Team trophy for 1995.

Ålabama teams took first in the other two classes. Claiming the top spot in "B" were Jack Henderson, Debbie Tidwell, and Mike Henderson. The best team winning record in the house (32 wins in 45 games) was posted by "C" leaders Jim Harris, Bobby Holland, and Michael Byram.

Adding near \$2,000 to the purse, Music City Team paid cash awards exceeding entry fees not only in "A" but in all classes. Six teams cashed in "A." The top three in "B" and "C" also cashed.


Thirty-five teams or team fragments attempted to enter. Twentyfour were accepted. That fact has prompted Freeman to issue fair warning to prospective entrants for 1996.

Only entries submitted in writing will be considered. A phone call won't do it. And, to effect an early entry, percentages will based on a September 1st NatStat report.

Next year, 1996, the length of the game may be changed to 40 shoes. Freeman is also considering a game time limit. In a wrap-up message Freeman said, "Thanks to all of you for participating in the Music City Team Tournament. Things went well and I hope all of you got the percentage you were hoping for."

(The winners may be an all-Ohio entry next time—Francis, Francis, and Brown. Alan said it. She said yes. How about Fred? "Oh, that's my dad," she said. The Alan Francis-Amy Brown wedding is planned for April 1996.)

Hall of Fame

This is just to remind all horseshoe pitchers that the Hall of Fame is a year 'round active enterprise and that from time to time some very interesting items pertaining to our beloved sport are sent to me for safekeeping.

In visiting with a player from California at the World Tournament in Georgia, I learned that a friend of his in California might make a contribution. Upon arriving home, I phoned Mr. George Greeott about a pair of original Mossman shoes and the longer we talked the larger the donation got to be. After a letter or two, we were both

elated at what had happened.

The package, sent by George for Hall of Fame display, included a shoe of his original pattern for the Greeott Grabber. It was handmade of white brass. Also included were one pair of original Detroit Flyers, of which I had none to that point. There was a pair of original Greeott Grabbers and one pair of Diamonds "Duluth, Minn." with no hooks. A real prize was one pair of Putt Mossmans (large hooks) pitched little or not at all. Last, but not least, was one pair of T.J. Octigans—the original round shoe with no hooks. T.J. Octigans added hooks in later years and then during World War I, their plant in Chicago was purchased by a foundry in the northeast and that brand of horseshoe then ceased to exist. What a valuable addition this has been to the NHPA collection and we thank you, George Greeott, for your generous donations.

The next find was when Bill Henn, of Kentucky, sent Dave Loucks a few old Horseshoe Worlds and Dave forwarded them to me. I sent Bill a thank you letter and later he sent me more news clippings, some 1942 photos of the Schultz sisters in exhibition, and seven large 8 x 10" photos of the championship classes of the World Tournament. They were dated 1940, 1946, 1947, 1949 and one was not dated, but included most of the women players. This is the only World Tournament photo I know of that included the women. Most of these photos numbered the players and the name of the player is written on the back of the picture. What a historical find these are for future reference. Thanks again, Bill!

Anytime you come across old scrapbooks, photos or anything that pertains to our sport, if you don't know what to do with it, don't throw it away! Instead, mail it to the Hall of Fame Chairman—my address is listed at the front of Newsline . I'll look forward to hearing from you.

Tennessee Twins Break Into World Championship Class

Two guesses. What, or who, has two blond pony tails, tall and slender, are easy to look at, often wearing a red top, black shorts, always seen in duplicate, pitching a ton of ringers? You should have two answers—the Tennessee twins, Maxine Griffith and Marlene Ray.

Maybe you saw them in Perry, Georgia. The pair drew lots of attention pitching in the Women's

Championship class.

This was not their first World Tournament but it was their first World Championship Class appearance. "We are just tickled to be in the Championship class," bubbled Max, or was it Mar. "But," one of the fairhaired girls continued, "It was our goal of a year ago. We pitched the '94 World at Syracuse in "B" class placing 4th and 5th." (For the record, Max was 4th with 55% and Mar finished 5th with 61%.)

Back home in Tennessee, the girls have the luxury of a personal indoor court. To make good on their goal they began practicing every day, at least six days a week. The twins were not new to the sport. Although their main competition has been each other they have won the Tennessee state title fourteen times—seven each, of course.

The advent of Jack Freeman's courts near Nashville had much to do with the rededication to the game. Still it's a three and one-half hour ride from their town of Covington. Max and Mar credit Jack Freeman for encouragement and opportunity and Dexter Stallings for his interest. Coaching and tips came from their top flight competitors Lois Webster, Sue Snyder, and Don Titcomb contributing. Obsessive practice linked with twelve tournaments just last year at the Tennessee complex steadily improved their game.

By World Tournament entry time the twins had raised their averages, exceeding 70% and earned a seed into the Women's A2 class. Max and Mar did the rest on site, moving up and qualifying as two of the top 16 in the Championship Class. Max



finished 13th with a 74% average. Mar took 11th pitching 70.3%. When they write the book on the most improved horseshoe pitchers for the year of 1995, the two leading characters will be the Tennessee twins, Maxine Griffith and Mar Ray.

Horseshoes has been a part of the family interest over the years. Unknowingly, their grandfather put the sport in their genes many years ago when the family lived in the state of New York. Grandfather, George Tweedy was a pitcher. The twins' father, Walter Shackelton and their mother also pitched. All three boys of the family played the game.

At a New York State tournament many years ago, Grandfather George took on the then 16 year old Carl Steinfeldt who had been winning. When the young Steinfeldt lost a tough game and began exhibiting some irrational behavior, Grandpa Tweedy walked him over to the fence saying, "Carl, someday you may become a great horseshoe pitcher, but you also have to learn how to lose gracefully." Carl Steinfeldt, a grand old man of horseshoes, went on to become State Champion of New York 18 times and vividly recalls the incident to this day.

Sports have always figured in the lives of the twins. They have the distinction of being honored as the first two girls inducted into the New York State Hall of Fame for high school athletes. Most times they competed together and finished lock step. In 1972, however, Max won the New York State archery title—alone.

Somewhere along the way Mar's bow broke.

The twins played four years of college volleyball and basketball, mostly together. For three years they confused opponents of the University of Tennessee. Max then transferred to Lambuth College for her final year. It was 1976 and Mar, with the UT team, defeated Lambuth to qualify for the National Intercollegiate Volleyball Tournament.

Today, they coach teams and referee games, high school and college, staying active in their environment—teachers. Naturally they are both math teachers. Mar teaches pre-algebra in junior high and Max gets the same class the next year. This year they claim to be retired gymnastics coaches heavy into coaching basketball. When interviewed recently by a newspaper, The Tennessean, Mar admitted it, "We're sort of jocks at heart."

Twins, jocks, girls at heart, but both have families to look after. Max has a 9 year old daughter, Rayna, or "Shack." Eddie Griffith is dad, operates his own construction company and that's the source of their indoor court. Mar is married to Bill Ray, an assistant director at the vocational school. They have two boys, Will Walter, 13, called "Dub", and George 6, tagged "Kane." (While nicknames abound, the name "Will Walter Ray" asks a real question among horseshoe pitchers.)

The identical twins can safely be addressed as, "Hi, MaxorMar," but pity the befuddled scorekeeper when they pitch each other. Actually they are mirror twins. Mar tosses her flip right-handed; Max is a lefty flipper.

Regardless, their purpose has been singular—to become World Class horseshoe pitchers. Having attained that goal at the Perry World, they were asked, "What's next?"

Without a hesitant glance towards each other they answered in near unison, "To be World Champion." Like, of course...

but who will be first?

1909 World Tournament (Summer) Bronson, Kansas

Perhaps it is fitting that, as human beings, we do not remember our own birth and must rely on stories handed down as to the circustances surrounding that important event. With this in mind, let us try to assemble the known facts of Year One of the World Horseshoe Pitching Tournament before we allow ourselves the luxury of conjecture.

It is known that an unnamed promoter of a Colt Show brought this event about by advertising it as a World Horseshoe Pitching Tournament. With the winning of this tournament was to come the title of Official Horseshoe Pitching Champion of the World and the awarding of a World Champion Belt. It is also known that this was a single elimination event.

The number of pitchers and their names are unknown except for Frank Jackson of Blue Mound, Kansas, who won the tourmament. It is quite likely that this event drew a large number of entries, necessitating a one loss and out format. The only known person still alive to witness the 1909 World Tournament is Clarence Townsley, also of Blue Mound, who later became Frank Jackson's father-in-law.

Horseshoe Pitching was quite popular in Kansas, Missouri, and Iowa. Earlier records show matches being played in 1900 in Independence, MO at their Convention Hall. (Perhaps this is where President Harry S. Truman developed his love of the game.)

Team matches were often staged in the years prior to 1909, An individual tournament was held at Kansas State University in Manhattan in the year 1907. Frank Jackson won that also.

Horseshoe clubs were known to exist in Long Beach, California; St. Petersburg, Florida; East Liverpool, Ohio and Meadville, Pennsylvania. Meadville is reputed to be the oldest in the land having a club prior to 1900. Students at the University of Pennsylvania were pitching during the 1800s, according to their 1922 student newspaper, when they were trying to revive the game.

Horseshoe pitching was also known to be in existence during the Revolutionary War. Ben Franklin was thought to be a pitcher.

It has been said that an annual World Tournament was held every summer in Kansas City, Missouri from 1910 to 1919. Hopefully, if after further investigation this proves correct, the National Horseshoe Pitchers Association will graciously sanction these tournaments so that these also will take their rightful place in the archives. This will also bring into recognition other of our earliest members who helped the sport expand and organized Horseshoe Pitching to survive.

Editor Note: Recent information from the author Gary Kline establishes that the above excerpt from his book requires some updating. Gary reports...

NO WORLD IN 1909 by Gary Kline

Those with the book *The Official NHPA History of the World Tournament 1909-1980*, be alert and find you a copy machine! Put this in your book! The first recognized World Horseshoe Tournament *didn't occur in 1909*. It happened in 1910.

While publishing the book, research was still going on. Contact with the Kansas State Historical Library resulted in someone reading the *Bronson Pilot* 1980 through 1911. What did we find? *At* 10:40 a.m. September 10, 1910 the first World Horseshoe Tournament began. \$5.00 was to be split between the two winning pitchers. The only two known rules were a stake distance of 38½ feet and bring your own shoes. The games were 21 points. There were 34 participants with Bronson having the most.

When competition was completed, the two survivors were Frank Jackson and Lonnie Wilson. Both were from Blue Mound, KS and each received \$2.50. Lonnie also earned \$5.00 for winning the fiddling contest. With only one championship belt, a playoff was required. Frank Jackson was the winner and can be seen wearing the belt in the book. The newspaper reports Jim Hunnel challenged Frank and was easily defeated both games.

This tournament was created by Colonel Lucky D. Long, an auctioneer. The main event of the day was a colt judging contest and auction.

The first women's championship was the 1920 Akron, OH event. Marjorie Vorhees of NJ, a Frank Jackson protegé, was the winner. She beat Miss Pillmore of Akron, OH. Miss Pillmore was trained by Hughie Palmer known as the "Grandfather of Horseshoe Pitching." Marjorie won the match three games to one.

West Essex Handicap Horseshoe Club's William Penn from East Orange and winner in Class O at the 1995 World Tournament, is the State's Most Improved Player, raising his percentage from 17.10 in 1994 to 30.81. Organizer of the event was Ron Weiss, President of the Western Pennsylvania Horseshoe Pitchers Association.

Open to the public, the event kicked off the 30th Anniversary celebration of the founding of the Wesley Institute,

a private non-denominational, non-profit agency providing professional services for at-risk youth and their families.

SOUTH CAROLINA

Bill Penland of York, who was voted in as the 9th member of the State's Hall of Fame, is a three-time state champion in the elder division and has supported horseshoe pitching for many years. PeeWee Murr was the elder statesman this past year, beating Penland, 3-1, in five game series.

In her first attempt, Naomi Williams of Lockhart, won the women's A-Class. Norman Kelly of Greenville, successfully defended his title in the open men's division winning his fifth tournament in six years.

The women's Championship was won by Barbara Taylor from Clover with the best of five, 3-0, over Shirley Feemster,

her fifth win in six years. Dean Broome of Dacusville went 4-0 to win the junior title.

TEXAS

News from the Tumbleweed Horseshoe PItchers Association in Buffalo Springs Lake, reveals that the "Buffalo Classic" was a little too lengthy for such a small field, but was historical in the sense that junior pitchers won first place in each of the classes in the mixed competition.

This has never occurred here before, but shows the level

of competition provided by juniors in the area.

Scott Johnson, a new pitcher this year in the NHPA, is to be commended for beginning an open juniors league at Buffalo Springs Lake. 


WYOMING



NatStats Reports the Top 1995 Pitchers

It is always interesting to view how our top average pitchers stack up against one another. The top NatStats averages were last reported in the May/June 1995 issue. Now we have the lists of the best averages compiled by pitchers for the first 11 months of 1995. As usual, some tournaments were not reported by tournament directors and so some of these numbers may not agree exactly with what your charter has on file. However, if the World entries were closing tomorrow, these would be the averages used.

The top 58 men are all above 70%. Three new names, Steve Hohl, Steve

Kuchcinski and Ron Powell, broke into the top ten percentages.

50 women are listed, all above 67%. Here we find 4 new names in the top ten—Amy Brown, Sandy Janssens, Sue Twyman and Maxine Griffith.

In the short distance Elders category, 49 men age seventy or more are averaging better than 59%. five new names have cracked the top ten—Don Harris, Jim Pagliarulo, Wm. Lou Rector, Henry Hostetler and Pete Rebman.

There are 40 junior boys above 45%. Six are new to the top ten as some names of a year ago have moved on to adult status while a few boys made

significant improvement. New to the top ten averages in the boys' category are Branson Miller, Jeremy Umphries, Stephen Morris, Dean Broome, Allen Keen and Bradley Dean.

We have listed the top 14 junior girls though it appears this group has regressed a bit. Eight months ago we had three girls above 60% and ten above 36%. Now, we have only one above 60% and just five above 36% though there are four very close behind the 36% number. Looking for new names in the top ten of this category, we see Michelle Jarrett, Misty Pierce, Chrissie Adams, Kara Hix and Autumn Miller.

The Toll of Time

CARL PFEFFER

The Wisconsin charter reports the death of Carl "Chuck" Pfeffer in October just a short time after his eighty-ninth birthday. This Milwaukee pitcher was a member of the Wisconsin HPA Hall of Fame, being inducted in 1981. His playing days go back many, many years. He won the State Championship at the Milwaukee Fair park in 1956 and 1958. His love of the game and the importance it had to him was well displayed at the funeral home by the many photos of Carl's pitching days and the pair of horseshoes that were tucked into the casket with him.

RALPH RASMUSSEN

Ralph Rasmussen of Minneapolis, Minnesota passed away September 20, 1995 at the age of 84. He had worked 45 years for First Bank where he retired as Bank president. Ralph was 3 time Minnesota State Junior Champion, winning titles in 19231925. The first title in 1923 was won in a play-off victory over NHPA Hall of Famer, Frank Stinson. Ralph gave up the game for some 40 years before he began pitching again in 1970 after retirement. He made his way up to a Class "A" pitcher in the tough Minneapolis Horseshoe Club and in 1993, Ralph was inducted into the State Hall of Fame in the Founders category.

D.W. STRICKLER

D.W. Strickler of Staunton, Virginia died November 2, 1995. He had been pitching horseshoes with a friend when he was struck down with a heart attack. D.W. was president and founder of the Churchville Horseshoe Club, a member of the Crozet and Grottoes clubs and a 25 year member of the NHPA. D.W. was a Navy veteran and retired in 1976 from the Virginia Department of Highways. In 1993, he was inducted into the Virginia HPA Hall of Fame.

Do's and Don'ts of Tournament Reporting to Newsline by Dave Loucks

This issue, the first of the year, is the one that catches the late reporting State Tournament results, those that were not received by the editor in time for the November/December issue. Between the two issues I was able to publish State results from only 31 charters, some of which I had to dig out of newsletters. Unfortunately, it seems that many charters do not care if their State Champions are noticed or not.

Of the 31 State Tournaments published, only 10 were sent to me in what I can call a format reasonably suitable for *Newsline*. Three of those were perfectly correct and I thank the New York, Oklahoma and Pennsylvania charters for sending results to *Newsline* in the proper format.

Reporting results to *Newsline* has to be done in a different manner than reporting to NatStats. To maintain your correct NHPA pitching average, NatStats requires things that *Newsline* does not. In fact, too much data on your report to *Newsline* only confuses

the typesetter and causes me to spend hours deleting information we can't print. So, here is a list of things I do want and a list of things I don't want when reporting State results to *Newsline*.

Do Provide (double spaced)

- State, Location, Date of Tournament and Sanction #.
- List Division Championship followed by descending classes.
- List all players in each Championship Group by order of finish.
- List only winner of each class below championship group.
- For each group provide in this order: First and last name, W-L, %.



Card #, ringers, shoes pitched, high game, entering average, points scored, hometown, club, office held, age, forfeits, pacers, all entrants in alphabetical order, or any report that is not double spaced.


