President's Message

The Council has been meeting monthly (via ZOOM) discussing the 2021 World Horseshoe Tournament and other business. The final decision on hosting the 2021 World Horseshoe Tournament was made earlier than we expected and has already been announced via e-blast and social media. We are all hoping for a great turn out, so please get your entries into Jim Kinney Jr.



With leagues starting for many Charters, the Council expects each one of you to do your part in growing our sport by signing up new members. It's "all" of our responsibility, so let's turn this declining membership trend around and start seeing positive numbers. Charter Secretaries, please remember to get your list of new members to Laura Lampkin (2nd VP). She is directing the membership committee in charge of sending out new member packages.

For those of you who did not attend last's years Delegate meeting, the Council requested an emergency By-Law change regarding the voting process for future World Tournament Sites. After much discussion and a vote on the floor, the delegates approved that the NHPA Council will oversee voting and approval of each future World Tournament site.

Now that the deadline (of April 1st) has passed for candidates to announce their candidacy for the positions of President and 5th VP. I am pleased to announce: 1) NHPA President - I have decided not to run after serving as your President for the past 12 years. Gary Roberts from the Ohio Charter will be the sole candidate for this position. 2) NHPA 5th VP - Dalton Rakestraw has announced his intentions to run for another term. Don Epps from the Ohio Charter announced his intentions to run for the position of 5th VP. Voting will take place at the delegate meeting to be held at the World Tournament.

The 2021 World Horseshoe Tournament will be held July 19th - July 31st, 2021 at the Winnemucca Events Complex. Members who are interested in attending should go on-line and fill out the entry form and make your reservations. Many of you have asked me if we were planning on having the same format and schedule. It is our intentions not to change anything currently, however each year is a challenge when working with different groups in different locations. June 8th is the deadline to get your entry in.

Preparing for World Tournament...Foul shoes

Hello fellow Pitchers! I hope all is well and you are getting back to pitching in your clubs and weekend tournaments.

I would like to discuss a rule that may come up in a contest and make sure everyone understands or feels confident in handling it if it comes up in a game. Let's talk about what happens when a foul shoe hits another live shoe in the scoring area.



RULE 5 - FOUL SHOES

Section A - Removal from Pit

A foul shoe is a shoe that is delivered in non-compliance with one of the rules listed below. It scores as a shoe "out of count" (see RULE 3, Section B.3) and is to be removed from the pit (if it appears to be within the scoring area of the stake) before any more shoes are pitched.

Note: Live shoes already in the pit area that may be disturbed by a foul shoe (or other live shoes), are not to be removed, unless they are knocked into foul territory and then come to rest in the scoring area. Live shoes shall be scored "as they lie", after all shoes for the inning have been pitched.

So when there are shoes in the scoring area (15.5 inches diameter) and an opponent pitches a shoe that hits the front bumper or side of raised court and then hits the opponent's legal shoe it won't cause the live shoe to become dead. If the foul shoe comes to rest in the scoring area, it must be removed. The legal or live shoe contacted by the foul shoe is still a counting shoe and is not to be removed unless it is displaced and hits the sides or back stop and comes to rest back in the scoring area.

If a foul shoe hits a live shoe in the scoring area, it does not make the live shoe become dead.

If the contestants agree to leave a foul shoe in the pit, then when any other shoe is thrown that makes

contact with that foul shoe, the shoe that was just pitched is still a live shoe unless it hits the sides or back stop which then makes it a foul or dead shoe.

If at all possible remove all foul shoes to avoid any problems.

I hope this helps you understand this rule better. Please let me know if there is a Rule, Requirement, Guideline or Specification that you want me to discuss or clarify.

Thanks for all you are doing to grow this great sport and bringing new members to the NHPA!

Staying safe when you travel.

As always, we want everyone to be safe when traveling, so here is some basic information for you to use a guide. Some state, local and governments have requirements, such as requiring people to wear masks. Save yourself unpleasant surprises and delays by checking for restrictions at your destination and anywhere you might stop along the way.

Keep in mind that restrictions can change rapidly depending on local conditions. It is also important to keep in mind the COVID-19 situation, such as the level of spread and presence of variants. In the U.S., you must wear a face mask on planes, buses, trains, and other forms of public transportation, even if you are fully vaccinated.

Know phone numbers for emergency purposes. Be sure to look up the emergency services numbers for your destination, even before you get there. It is also a good idea to look up the number for the nearest immediate care facility or hospital before you leave. Write them down or save them in your phone so you will have quick access to them in the event of an emergency.

Check in with friends and family often.

Before you leave let someone know your itinerary and update them to any changes of plans. Make a habit of checking in with a close friend or family member back home at the end of each day. We know this can seem like a hassle, but ultimately, it is better to be safe than sorry. If something terrible were to happen, you will get help faster if someone knows where you were supposed to be that day.

Use apps for emergency alerts.

There are a variety of apps out there aimed to provide safety travel information and help travelers safe. Sitata is a great app that alerts users to potential dangers or disruptions to travel in real time. It also includes tips for avoiding the latest scams and helps users locate nearby hospitals.

Smart Traveler is the official U.S. State Department app for travelers. There are many useful features, including notifications for travel advisories and alerts, such road construction, detours, etc.

Ask locals for advice.

When you check in at a hotel or hostel, ask for recommendations about which neighborhoods are safe and which are not so safe and mark places to avoid on your map.

Be smart about your money.

Any solid resource of travel safety information will tell you that it is never a good idea to carry huge amounts of cash. Instead, open an account with an international bank or credit card company so you can use local ATMs. If you absolutely must withdraw large amounts of cash at once, leave the bulk of it locked up safely in your hotel or hostel and carry only what you will need for the day.

When using ATMs, try to use only those that are attached to banks as these are less likely to have been tampered with by scammers. Never keep all of your money in one place. Keep cash and credit cards in two or three different places so that if one of your stashes is stolen you are not left completely empty-handed.

Now that you are armed with these simple safety tips for traveling, it is time to get out and explore the world! Happy and safe travels, everyone!





Time for Leagues to begin...if you haven't

As we begin to get back to pitching horseshoe in most parts of the country, I find more leagues are being pitched and are being sent in. This seems to be a good time to let league directors know where we are on league procedures. The paperwork is the same as always, you send me the final stats and the patch order form. The eShoe program has changed the process for membership and tournament data entry and allows us to have up to the minute information and pitching averages. While it is possible to input league data directly into eShoe if you know how, please note that I am the only one authorized to enter league data. Certainly, I would enjoy less work to do. But, If the league data does not come to me, I cannot track awards,



"Top Ten" stats, junior scholarship records nor league longevity. None of these things are currently able to be tracked by eShoe. The eShoe program was never intended to replace the Sanctioned League Director's position or to track the necessary needed data. It is hoped that the league phase of our software upgrade will enhance HSMaster's ability to run and track league data. Hold on to that thought, it is phase three of the NHPA's master plan to re-write HSMaster.

Specking of longevity, all leagues that did not have leagues in 2020 were automatically given a waiver for that year. There is no need to send me the form "Request a New Sanction League", just go out there and get your league going again. If the league director duties were handed down to new personnel and they need help, be sure to have them get in touch with me. If you are still having problems holding this year's league, let me know your situation and we will work it out.

The annual Sanctioned League Team Tournament is still scheduled for October 2nd and 3rd and will be held in Wentzville, MO as usual. The facility has been closed for many months; however, it looks like it will be fully opened by the tournament date. Stay tuned for updates and the flyer will be sent out in an eblast soon. Get your teams together and let me know of your interest. If I have trouble fielding 20 teams or the facility is restricted in any way, I will have to cancel this event again. Once again, the three person teams can be made up of pitchers from any league and from any state. Call me for details. This is short, which is probably desirable to most readers, but I am in the process of moving again and will be a beloved Buckeye by the time the World Tournament rolls around. Just when I thought I could drive to the WT in a few hours, I will have a two-thousand-mile trip again, bad timing, I guess. I will try and keep league data inputted and patches sent out the best I can but expect some dark times and delays. See you at the 2021 World Tournament, it is going to be awesome. I will be giving out the "Sanctioned League Director of the Year" award for both 2019 and 2020. I have not decided how to handle the "Longevity" awards with all the 2020 waivers, but the waivers should not penalize the leagues.

In the last issue of "Newsline" I held a raffle to encourage members to check out the updated NHPA webpage. I was disappointed with the number of responses but understand and hope that it was just the effort to look up the answers and not that the article was not read. So, I will extend the raffle to the World Tournament and see if any more participants send in answers. This adds the burden of looking up the last "Newsline" article to find the quiz. At any rate, do check out the webpage and see what you think. A lot of effort was put into this project and is still happening. See you at the WT, look for another Buckeye!








NHPA Rule Review-Rule 6-Scoring The Game

RULE 6 - Scoring the Game

(a) RULE 6 - SCORING THE GAME, CALLING THE SCORE

(b) Section A - Methods of Scoring

There are two methods of scoring the game of horseshoes: cancellation scoring and count-all scoring. The method of scoring to be used shall be announced by the Tournament/ League Officials before the tournament begins. Note: Shoes that land outside of the "in count" area or that are declared foul shoes (see RULE 5) shall score zero (0) points.

- 1. Cancellation Scoring In cancellation scoring, the ringer(s) of one contestant cancel the ringer(s) of the opponent. Cancelled ringers are also referred to as "dead" ringers. Note: only one contestant can score in each inning.
 - (a) Ringer Point Values Any cancelled ringer scores zero (0) points. Any un-cancelled (live) ringer scores three (3) points.
 - (b) Shoes In Count A shoe six (6") inches or closer to the stake is "in count" and shall score one (1) point under the following conditions:
 - 1. If there are two (2) cancelled (dead) ringers and no live ringer, the closest shoe to the stake, which is in count, shall score one (1) point.
 - 2. If there are no ringers, the closest shoe in count shall score one (1) point. If the other shoe of the same contestant is the second closest shoe in count, it shall score one (1) additional point.
 - 3. If there is one un-cancelled (live) ringer and if the other shoe, of the scoring contestant, is the closest in-count shoe to the stake, it shall score one (1) point (a total of four (4) points).
 - 4. Opposing contestant's shoes that are touching the stake, or that are in count and determined to be an equal distance from the stake, shall cancel each 15 PLAYING RULES other and, like cancelled ringers, shall score zero (0) points. In this situation, the next closest shoe in count (if there is one) shall score one (1) point.
- 2. Count-all Scoring In count-all scoring, both contestants receive credit for the points they score in each inning.
 - (a) Point Values Each contestant may score zero (0), one (1), two (2), three (3), four (4), or six (6) points per inning.
 - (b) "Ringers Only" A variation of count-all scoring where the contestants only receive credit for the ringers they pitch, for all innings of the game. In this format, each ringer is worth one (1) point. Each contestant may score zero (0), one (1), or two (2) points per inning. This type of scoring should be limited to higher percentage classes. Note: Single points are not countable in this pitching format.






Regional Director Spotlight Casey Sluys (Northern California)

Now for those who do not know, where is the line drawn for Northern and Southern California? If you look at a map of California and draw a straight line at the top of the counties of San Bernadino, Kern, and San Luis Obispo, you have the dividing line. Casey covers everything North of those counties. This is a lot of ground to cover which is why California is split between two RDs. Casey became Regional Director in 1989 to 2000. He took some time off and was re-elected to the position in 2009 and has served in this role since. He explains the most challenging thing about being an RD is teaching the club officers what court sanctioning is about and how the courts are to be sanctioned and up to par for integrity of the game. His best accomplishment while in office, he says, was when he gave a speech to the San Jose Parks and Rec board. He states, "WE were there in force as a club and I spoke on behalf of the NHPA, handing out copies of the Newsline, NCHPA News & Views, along with other brochures. We were letting them know we are a viable organization. That speech led them to put in 21 state of the art courts at zero cost to the NCHPA."

Casey is a true horseshoe pitching organizer and player. His dedication to our sport is untouchable. He has accomplished many things in our sport. He has won many awards and recognitions. He is always willing to help and looking to help on anything. The next time you are in Northern California, give Casey a call, he will tell you every inch of every court in his charter and give you precise directions to those locations. Ringers Heard Round the World...Part II Stan Griggs

The series for 2021 will highlight some of the most competitive World Tournaments we have ever seen in all divisions.

The 1975 Junior Boy's Championship Class has to be considered as the best Junior World Tournaments ever, as four of the boys exceeded the 80% mark. John Passmore's incredible 89.5% tournament average still stands as a Junior Boys' World Record today and that only got him a 4th place finish.

Speaking of "World Records" – these eight boys put on one heck of a demonstration as they dueled past 11:00pm and set a total of 17 World Records that evening.



The Single Game, Both Players Combined Ringer Percentage record was broken 4 times during the evening, the first time by John Passmore and Mike Strout in game 4 with a 87.2%. Just minutes later also in game 4 that record was then broken again by the Williams Brothers, Walter Ray and Jeff with an 88.8%. In the next round of games, game #5 Rick Howe and John Passmore broke it once again with a monster marathon game of 190 shoes (World Record) and a new record average of 90.0%. In the last game of the night the record would be broken one final time between Jeff Williams and John Passmore averaging 90.3%.

In what adds more dimension and significance to the 1975 Records, these were all during the 50 Point Era.
